### THE EARL OF DUNRAVEN.

The *Pall Mall Gazette* of last evening had the following biographical sketch of the Earl of Dunraven, Under Secretary for the Colonies:—

"Sir Windham—Thomas Wyndham—Quin, K.P., has shot mountain sheep and other wild and far-away animals with so much benefit to his own health that he would pass for a good many years less than his real age, which is 45. He comes of a 'rable ould stock,' his ancestors being chiefs of the clan of Hy-Ifearnan, who descend from Cormac Cas, son of Ollioll O'Him, Monarch of Ireland at the beginning of the third century. This is a pedigree he shares with the O'Briens, but whether the editor of *United Ireland* is among them we do not know. Besides being Earl of Dunraven and Mount Earl, he has, of course, several other patents of nobility, such as Nearon, Adare and Baron Kenry, and what is perhaps even more to his credit, he was a favoured friend of the ever-memorable "Uncle Sam" Ward, of New York. His father was the learned Lord Dunraven, antiquary and patron of all Celtic researches to whom Montalembert dedicated one of the volumes of the 'Monks of the West.' Lord Dunraven is a slender gentleman, with very dark complexion, a waxed moustache, and an expression of countenance 'more forcible than polite.' He is an ardent sportsman, living among trophies of his skill and courage, and there are few creatures even among the rarest and most remote wild game of the world, that have not fallen before his rifle. He is an accomplished man in other respects, too, and he has recently made, we believe, a tour of inspection in the Colonies in order to speak with authority. He has written much about sport in an excellent and entertaining style, wears the best-cut frock coat in the House of Lords, and has investigated, among other matters, the phenomena of spiritualism. His lordship holds deeply-rooted opinions upon many subjects, and this may be his undoing."
