

Harte is found in the **Civil Survey**, **1656**, of Limerick where a **Richard Harte** is given as the occupier of a house in John St. formerly the property of George Rochford, Irish Papist. The same Survey carries a footnote on page 147 saying that all Nicholas Lyllie's holdings went to his son and heir Simon but Simon died soon after and all the lands went to Simon's two sisters Ellen and Elinor and their respective husbands. Ellen was married to **Henry Harte** and Elinor was married to Piers Creagh. Ellen and Henry were also dead and their son and heir was **George Harte**. Piers and Ellinor were still living as was Ensign Alexander Hoviddon the next husband of Ellen Harte nee Lillies.





The Civil Survey also shows Richard Harte holding Ballyvord and Clughannamanagh, 150 acres with Carriggaslagane, 50 acres in the Parsh of Monasternenagh. This refers to 1641. In 1655 Richard Harte of Ballyvenoge was one of the Jurors for the Barony of Coshmae.

Irish Genealogy.ie, have a burial record for a Captayn Percivall Harte who was buried in St. Johns in Dublin on the 5 Sept. 1664.

The Harte names appear in the TCD depositions also. (Google: - 1641 depositions).



There was another Richard Harte of Coolrus who was already dead when his daughter Elizabeth married Augustine Fitzgerald in 1767.

Sir Richard Harte was born in 1736 or 1740 and was admitted a Freeman in 1762, he was elected Sheriff in 1768, and elected a Burgess in the following year, 1769. He became Mayor in 1774 and a son was born while he was Mayor (**DHJ**). He was elected an Alderman in 1775, was Mayor again in 1806 and died in February 1824, aged 88 years, (**GM**) he was therefore born circa 1736. Another source says born in 1740 and died aged 84. He married, 1768, first Ann Johnson the daughter of William Johnson of Flemingstown, South West of Mitchellstown, Co. Cork by whom he had an only son William Johnson Harte, born 1770. Ann died in Youghal on the 2nd Sept. 1785, he then married, at Cahernarry, on the 17th January 1789 (**CG**), the widow Margaret Mahony of Batterfield, Co. Kerry who had a considerable fortune. Richard's son, William Johnson Harte married Marion, his step-sister, the daughter of Margaret Mahony in 1796. Their eldest son Richard, born 1797, appeared before the Court of

Claims on the 12 Oct. 1825 and was admitted a Freeman on the 26 June 1826. This **Richard** died in 1842, aged leaving two minor children, Richard and Mary as his heirs. The Mansion house of Coolruss with its Gardens, Orchards Pleasure-Grounds and portion of the Demesne lands belonging thereto containing in all about 106 acres, plantation measure were put up for leasing as Lot 1 of 7 divisions of the estate. The lease was for 7 years so the eldest heir must have been 13/14 years old. See Limerick Chronicle of March 18th 1843.



Henry Hickman Harte, son of William Harte, a solicitor, entered T. C. D. on the 7th July 1806, aged 16. He was born in Limerick City circa 1790. He was awarded a B.A. in 1811 and became a fellow of T.C.D. in 1831. He died in 1848. See D. N. B. He was the son of William Harte, attorney and his wife Hannah, dau. of Poole Hickman. They lived at Knockferry, Co. Limerick. William Harte, attorney died 1796. Hannah remarried Edward Galway of Lota in 1807.

John Harte entered T.C.D. on the 5th July 1821, aged 17, therefore born 1804 in Limerick. He was the son of William Harte, Solicitor. John got his B.A. in 1827. A John Harte was buried in Bruff having died on the 4 Dec. 1875, aged 69. Tombstone erected

In Griffiths Valuation the Lands of Coolrus are under the control of the Court of Chancery.

Eldest son, Richard Harte claimed admittance as a Freeman by birth, on the 12 Oct 1825. This Richard died in 1842 and the estate seems to have passed to his brother James Mahony Harte who leased a large part of Ballinacurra Harte to William Vokes in 1854.



Limerick Chronicle. 03/03/1827.

To be let from the 25th March 1827. The House, Offices, Gardens and Demesne of Coolruss in the Co. of Limerick, containing 48 acres. The house is very commodious with offices well disposed. A greater quantity of land could be given. Proposals to Henry Harte, Richmond Place, Limerick.

Sir Richard Harte of Richmond Place, i.e. "The Cresent" died in 1824. (His only son and heir, William Johnson Harte, had died in 1814).



Familysearch, Pilot, identifies Elizabeth Harte baptised 05/06/1811, Wilhelmina Harte baptised 06/03/1813 and William Harte baptised 26/01/1815.

Mahony Harte, entered TCD on the 5th Nov. 1821 aged 16. Therefore born 1805. He was the son of William [Johnson] Harte, Gentleman and was born in Limerick. He got his B.A. in 1826. This must be the Mahony Harte who was involved in leasing out the lands of Ballinacurra Hart in the mid 1800's. The Earl of Limerick originally leased Ballinacurra Hart to Sir Richard Harte in the late 1700's. Sir Richard had the Wilson family as his tenants and the

Vokes family married into the Wilson family in 1785. Thereafter the Vokes family figure prominently in Ballinacurra Hart. The Wilsons moved out to Doonass, Co. Clare in the 1830's.



Sir Richard had a sister, Mrs Hugh Parker (Rev.). She died at Tralee a widow in 1816 aged 87 therefore born circa 1729. (Catherine Parker nee Harte?)

Register of Freeholders of Limerick. (Establishing his right to vote in Elections)

Richard Harte of the City of Limerick registered himself as the owner of lands in Ballinacurra, valued at £100 on the 19th Jan. 1796.

The Earl of Limerick leased Ballinacurra Hart to Richard Harte on the 1st Aug 1775. The Earl of Limerick leased the same to Mahony Harte on the 20 Nov. 1860.

Percival Harte of Coolruss was High Sheriff of Co. Limerick in 1783.

Registry of Deeds. No. 175280.

Percival was alive and a witness to a deed dated 1/7/1768.

Registry of Deeds. No's 84792 and 85359.

Both Deeds name William Harte of Coolruss in 1746. In 84792 he seems to be buying land in Connelloe Barony for £1233.


Limerick Chronicle. 21/02/1903

Died suddenly at Coolrus on the 19th Feb. 1903, Richard Harte.

Lot 2, in Ballinacurra Hart on Griffiths Valuation Map, was leased by James Mahony Harte to William Vokes in 1854 at a rent of £22-9-2 per annum. See map. This land later became Greenpark race course circa 1869.

Richard Harte of Coolrus who died in 1903 is not in the 1901 Census.



Percival Harte of Lisofin, Gent. was witness to a lease on the above date. He is given as Pierswall Harte of Liscofin. It's obvious that who ever did the transcribing misread the name and address.

Percy Harte of Coolnits is mentioned, again we have bad transcription. Coolrus is the correct address. As for Percy it is possible that Percival was called Percy for short.




Richard Harte of Cloghmanagh was a nephew of Sir Richard Southwell of Singland in the Liberties of Limerick City.

+ Percival mentions his cousins, William Johnson Harte and Percival Harte, sons of Richard Harte his kinsman. William Harte, cousin. Matthew Jennings, Martha Johnson, Margery McMahon and Cath. Parker. But Query if the said Wm. J. H. and O. H. are sons or grandsons of the above Richard Harte."

It should be mentioned here that Betham used only wills written between 1700 and 1800 and that he was Chief Herald from 1820 to his death in 1853, therefore these Abstracts were compiled during this time period.

Richard and Mary are the children of the late Richard Harte, son of William Johnson Harte, brother of Maria Mason, nee Harte.

The Mason family lived at Cooleen near Bruree, in Coshma Barony. Their house was not very far East of the Harte house at Coolrus. The Mason, Naish, Harte and Johnson families were all related through marriage.

Cooleen, Charleville is either a mistake or Richard Harte Mason decided to call his house in Charleville, if he had one there, after the original home place.
