

If an election in the South sould be conceived under the present conditions there would certainly be an overwhelming mejority in the Dublin Parliament for Sunn Feie, and, though the Act offered no prospect of an enduring peace, he was inclined to think that Sinn Fein would LENSES FOR THE EYES be well advised to accept it—as Ireland bad accepted uneasisfactory measures beforeas a spring-board from which they could jamp off to something better. They

might take the view that such powers as the Act would give them would put them in a better pesition to continue their fight and accept it in that spirit without any intention of giving the fight up. Bishop Cohaian discisimed any knowledge of what might be in the mind of the Sinn Fein leaders in this connection and made is clear that he was not speaking in any representative capaclay. In answer to the question whether he thought there was any real chance of Sinn Fein making such use of the Act, he said he thought there was no possibility in the Ast which would be unperceived by the Sinn Fein leaders. He was definitely of the opinion, however, that the Act certainly did not make for a lasting peace and that the Government were very shortsighted in not having been more generous, parsicularly where finance was

concerned. WAGES AND PRICES

Conditions in the United States

The New York correspond to to the London "Times" says-With over 2,000,000 men out of work, or temporarily paid off, American industry is restarting work on a reduced wage scale. The most notable reductions are those effected in the textile industries, where wages have been out 221 per cent. On the whole, the men are accepting work under the new conditions with good grace, recogn'sing that these conditions are the only alternative to the closing down of the milis ; but in places there are voniferous protests. While the men argue that the employers have waxed fat on profits of the war period, the employers point to the refusal of the public to buy, and declare that they cannot afford to produce if war-time wages have to be paid. Even with the reduction of 234 per cent in textile and allied industries, wages, according to the employers, will still be 1:0 per cent higher than they were before the war. In traies where wage cuts are most prenonneed the public is already begin. ning to benefit by the consequent reduction is prices, and it is now possible to buy two suits of closhes, two pairs of boots, or three shirts for the price demanded last year for one. The loat of bread, which at one time last year sold for 6d, has now come down to 8d. But in such matters as fuel, light, and rest the public is still paying exorbitant and exosesive prices. New York is now swarming with huyers for the retail houses of the M ddle West and West, and manufacsurere are hopeful that in a few months' time the wheels of industry will once more be regolving at a satisfactory speed. Manufacturers also profess gravification as the improved output of their reduced working forces, as during the period of contraction they eliminated much of the "drifewood!" in the labour world, retaining only the best men, and are careful to suployment.

TERRIFYING EVENTS

In Charleville District

Our Charleville correspondent writes-The terrifying events of the past week, coming swiftly on a district which has hitherto been singular for its peaceful condition, will not be forgotten for some time by the resdents of Ballyhea. The attempted ambush of a military car near Shinana railway bridge on Tuesday night or early on Wednesday mersing, is the first incident of the kind which has taken place in the Charleville area. Fortunately, there were no ensualties of a serious hature, otherwise the consequences might be much more severs. From particulars gleaned in the locality is would appear that after the attacking party had out the tremebes they removed all the gravel with horses and carts, which were probably commandeered at the houses of farmers in the locality. Some of the gravel they deposited on the slope of the rallway bridge, while the balance was carted into an adjoining field. This was apparently done with the object of preventing the filling of the breaches. Besides the tremshes other obstructions were also placed on the road to impede the progress of any passing vehicle. Up to Thursday the main road between Charleville and Buttevant was impassible for traffic, and it was officially intimated to the inhabitants of the district that unless the breaches were repaired by a certain hour reprisals would be taken. A barricade was, is appears, placed on the road near the residence of Mr Michael Boddie, and his residence was subsequently blown up wish a bomb by the military. He witnessed from a military lorry the demolition of his house, being a prisoner in custody at the time. Fearing the destruction of their property, a number of farmers in the locality arrived on the scope with horses and carse, and closed in the breaches on the road, which is ones more passable. During Wednesday and Thursday the military scarched a number of houses in the locality. Michael Boddle and the two Fitzgeralds are, It is understood, still detained in Buttevant.

KILLEO

IN CORK AMBUSH

A report reached Cork on Friday of an ambush of a party of police some distance from Waterfall, about five miles from Oork. As far as can be learned the ambushed party consisted of only two police. Head Constable Larkin and Sergeant Bickham, both stationed at Ballincolity. They left the barrack early on Friday morning on bioycles and rode to Waterfall, where they had some business to transact. Leaving Waterie'l, they were apparently journeying towards Oork, being on duty in the visinity of Waterfall, when they were nucx. pectedly fired on from behind the fence in a secluded and lonely pert of the road. A volley of shots rang out, and Sergeant Bloxbam swayed on his machine and oreshed to the ground. Head Constable Larkin replied to the fire of the assailants, and continuing cycling managed to make his escape. The astackers are believed have suffered no easuables. Head Constable Larkin cycled to Cork, and reported the matter at Union Quay Police Barracks. He himself, conteary to what was at first reported, was not wounded. Large forces of pelice and military journeyed to the scene of the ambush from Ballinoolig and Cork, Sergeant Bloxham's body was still lying on the road, near his bioyole, where he had failen, and it was found that he was dead. From the nature of his wounds it is believed that death was practially instantaneous.

And Taken to Cork

A sensation (writes our correspondent) was caused in the Charleville district on Friday when it became definitely known that the Riv Father T Mannix, O O, Ballyhea, had been placed under arrest by the military and removed to Buttevant military barracks. No infermation is available as to the reasons for his detention or as regards the charges, if any, to be formulated against him. He is a first cousin of Archbishop Mannix, while his aunt, Sister Augustine, is a member of the Convent of Mercy, Buttevant. 
