MR. DE VALERA
TO THE PEOPLE
Manifesto on the Situation
Mr de Valera on Friday night issued the
following manifesto to the Irish people, on the
second anniversary of the meeting of Dail
Eireann:—
I am glad to be with you on this second
anniversary of the formal confirmation of our
nation's undying desire for its ancient indepen-
dence; the founding of our State on the
accidental will of the people; the giving practical
effect to the principles which we have held as
our national principles—principles accepted during
the war as the only basis for a lasting peace
between the nations; the faithfulness with
which through two terrible years you have
stood firm in the face of ruthless repression
will make our national motto, cast as long as
human records endure a glorious exception in
this sad period of abandonment of ideals,
conscienceless betrayal.
Great indeed have been your sufferings.
For months authentic despatches brought
news of the almost daily assassination of
representative citizens, of the ostiose murder
and mutilation of defenceless prisoners,
of the flogging and inhuman tortures of
brave men, even the boy condemned to
the scaffold who would not be false to the
patriot comrades; the cruel and the wanton
abuse of unarmed citizens, women and
children, in the public places, of the burnings
of homes and the looting and destruction of
the fruits of your industry, and I know how
heavy the price you were being made to pay
for your freedom; but thank God, through the
armed bulwark of your streets and with
steadfastness in your hearts you have
warded off the assaults of your oppressors,
and the persecutors of their day in
yours and your suffering have been
taught you how dearly bought and how
precious is the heritage of nationhood they
have passed on to you to guard. Thank God that
splendid moral which has made you the
wonder of the nations remain unbroken, and
the secret of your more lasting success, though
with brute force brave men and brave women
may be murdered, brute force can never reach
the spirit that inspires them.
Your sufferings will surely not be in vain.
The surrender of right, which alone could give
victory to the cause, has not been made, and
its fulfilment can never come.
Love of country and of freedom will in your
case, as in others, prove superior to the might
of his Empire, and every drop of patriot blood
that he sheds will be made for us more sacred
the spirit of perseverance and more certain its
fulfilment.
No one can be base enough now to barter
away that for which our nation have given up
themselves, and so through the moment is dark
and the world unending, confident of final
success, with calm deliberation, let us face the
New Year of the Republic ready to endure
what ever may be necessary to win for those
who come after us a priceless boon of per-
manent peace and secure liberty in their native
land.

Partition Act as "Spring-
Board"
Should Sinn Fein Accept It?
Views of Bishop Cahalan
Most Rev Dr Cahalan, Bishop of Cork, in
the course of an interview given to a repre-
sentative of the "Manchester Guardian" said
he had discussed the Partition Act with a great
many people, but nobody took any interest
in it, and while it was taken for granted
that the Act would be worked in Ulster,
he had not found a single person who had
even read it in the South. If an election
in the South could be conceived under the
present conditions there would certainly be
an overwhelming majority in the Dublin
Parliament for Sinn Fein, and though the Act
offered no prospect of an enduring peace, he
was inclined to think that Sinn Fein would
be well advised to accept it—as Ireland had
accepted, unsatisfactory measures before—
as a spring-board from which they could
jump off to something better. They
might take the view that such power as
the Act would give them would put
them in a better position to continue their
fight and accept it in that spirit without any
intention of giving the fight up. Bishop
Cahalan declined any further comment, but
he might be in the mind of the Sinn Fein
leaders in this connection and made it clear that
he was not speaking in any representative capacity.
In answer to the question whether he
thought there was any real chance of Sinn
Fein making such use of the Act, he said he
thought there was no possibility in the Act
which would be unperpetrated by the Sinn Fein
leaders. He was definitely of the opinion,
however, that the Act certainly did not make
for a lasting peace and that the Government
were very unfortunally in not having been
more generous, particularly where finance was
concerned.

WAGES AND PRICES
Conditions in the United States
The New York correspondent of the London
"Times" says—With over 2,000,000 men out
of work, or temporarily paid off, American
industry is rearing work on a reduced wage
scale. The most notable reductions are those
of the textile industries, where wages
have been cut 25 per cent. On the whole,
the men are accepting work under the
new conditions with good grace, recog-
nising that these conditions are the only
alternative to the closing down of the mills.
In places there are vociferous protests.
While the men are protesting the employer has
waxed fat on profits of the war, and the
employers point to the refusal of the public
to buy, and declare that they cannot afford to
produce if war-time wages have to be paid.
Even with the reduction of 25 per cent in
textile and allied industries, wages according
to the employers, will still be 1.0 per cent
higher than they were before the war. In
trades where wage cuts are most pro-
nounced the public is already begin-
ning to benefit by the consequent reduction in
prices, and it is not possible to buy two pairs
of clothes, two pairs of boots, or three pairs
of shoes for the price demanded last year for one.
The cost of bread, which as one thus last year
sold for 6d, has now come down to 3d. But
in such places the men are protesting, and
the public is still buying, and the whole
situation is very unfortunally in not having
been more generous, particularly where finance was
concerned.

The wife of a man who had been proved a
