DE COURCY'S SALE OF GRAZING LETTINGS.

This important fixture was held on Friday last in adverse weather conditions. The letting comprised 91 divisions, the highest yet at this letting, which can now claim to be the biggest and most important letting in the country. The attendance was again remarkably good and some very high prices were realised. Grazing, however, is not as easily let as compared with last year, a number of divisions having been set at substantially reduced prices. In one case 11 acres, which made £12 2s. 6d. per acre last year, were sold for £7 10s. per acre this year. A number of similar transactions occurred during this letting, but against this several divisions met keen competition and in a few cases doubled last year's letting prices. Taken on the average the lettings are not as high as last year and the aggregate for the day's sales at £3,560 showed a slight decrease on last year's aggregate for the day's lettings. Since then, however, further substantial lettings have been made, which would bring the total over £5,000 for the lettings offered at the annual sale.

Tuesday, February 11th—The entry for to-day's market showed a decrease in numbers as compared with last week owing to the very severe weather conditions; ordinary description, no choice or promising cows or heifers on offer; small attendance. Wednesday, February 12th—Owing to the very severe weather conditions, small supplies of both cattle and sheep were sent in to-day; the attendance of buyers was strong and representative. In beef department entry of prime bullocks and heifers met a brisk trade and sharp competition, especially medium weighted heifers, at advanced rates; heiferish cow beef steadily placed at dearer rates; well fed cattle wanted and sold well. Complete clearance and dearer rates all round. Small supply of store cattle, no forward or aged lots on offer. Choice colour dairy heifers in fair demand, and useful drafts placed at late rates. A steady trade in this department, and a very good clearance effected. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £35 10s. to £40; second run, £28 10s. to £34 10s.; fat cows, best, £39 to £45; second run, £29 10s. to £34 10s.; old, £17 10s. to £23 5s.; second run, £13 5s. to £16 15s.; 2 year old bullocks and heifers, £12 5s. to £15 15s.; second run, £9 5s. to £11 5s. Sheep—Numbers showed a decrease; the turn-out, however, included a large percentage of prime sheep; trade opened firm and steady, with brisk demand. Well fed wethers freely bid for, marked competition for prime sheep; dearer rates all round, one pen of wethers realising 179/- each. Buyers operated freely; suitable sheep met active inquiry and sharp demand. Supply not up to requirements, and more sheep could easily have been sold. Trade all round well supported, with an early finish; market sold up except for one pen. Fat middle-weight, 166/- to 179/-; second run, 145/- to 162/6; small, 135/- to 140/-; hoggets, 69/- to 78/-.—Wm. B. Fitt & Co., Auctioneers.

LIMERICK CATTLE MARKET.

The entry at to-day's market showed an increase as compared with last week, but was below the average as weather conditions are still unfavourable. The demand for good cows had eased off and vendors in some cases did not make the necessary concessions in values to effect sales, this only occurred in a few cases, the majority of the entry changed hands and there was quite a good number of buyers at the sale. Top price for calves cows went to Mr. James O'Malley, Laccareigh, Killalea, at £30, followed by Mr. D. Curack, Singland, at £29 10s. Top price for in-calf heifers going to Mr. James McNamara, Singland, at £29. Top price for calving heifers went to Mr. Thomas Gunning, Killigay House, Kibane, Broadford, at £28 10s. A bawn of spring calving dairy cows sold at from £14 to £21. In-calf and calved cows, best, £25 10s. to £30; seconds, £20 to £23 10s.; others, £14 to £18 15s. In-calf and calved heifers, best, £23 to £29; seconds, £19 to £22. Stores, an increased entry met a dull trade; buyers operating cautiously, the improved rates evident for some weeks back were not repeated; a fair volume of business was transacted as a good many buyers were prepared to sell at prevailing rates.
