DEATH OF MR. J. J. DALY

With very much regret we announce the death of Mr. John J. Daly, Curraghgour View, Limerick, who passed away on Wednesday. The deceased, who had passed the eighty mark, was a widely esteemed and highly-respected citizen, and deservedly so, for he was a man of admirable principles and characteristics and of the highest integrity. Deeply religious, he was for a number of years back a Diamond Jubilarian of the Arch-Confraternity of the Holy Family attached to the Redemptorist Church, having joined that body when a very young boy. He was also a member of the Sacred Heart Sodality attached to the Jesuit Church. An exemplary husband and father, he had the great happiness of seeing three of his family embracing the religious life, namely, Rev. Dominic Daly, Los Angeles, California; Sister Mary Alphonsus, Mercy Convent, Nenagh, and Sister Mannes, O.P., Cape Town, South Africa. Although never obtruding himself much in public or political life, he held strong national sentiments and took a great interest in the advancement of the country. His death is deeply regretted by all who knew him and were aware of his fine qualities and upright disposition. To the bereaved relatives we extend our very sincere sympathy. Requiem Mass for the repose of his soul was offered up to-day (Friday) in St. Mary's Church, and the funeral, which was very large and representative, took place afterwards to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery.
