DE COURCY'S LAND SALES

On Monday last, at the Salesrooms, 7, Glentworth Street, Limerick, Mr. de Courcy offered for sale by auction, on the instructions of Patrick Carmody, his holding at Punchbowl, Meelick, containing 5 acres 2 roods and 20 perches (S.M.), held from the Irish Land Commission subject to the revised annuity of £1 3s. 2d. P.L.V., £2 10s. Bidding for this holding opened at £130 and advanced to £200, at which price and auction fees Mr. Thomas McNamara, Cratloekeel, Co. Clare, was declared the purchaser. Messrs. T. O'B. Kelly & Son, solicitors, had carriage of sale.

SALE OF COWS AND HEIFERS AT CROOM

On Friday last, Mr. Louis de Courcy, auctioneer, conducted a most important dispersal sale by auction of dairy cows and heifer calves for Mr. John Prendergast, who has decided to change his system of farming. The cows were well-known locally as being an exceptionally good bawn; they were brought along in excellent condition and much interest was taken in the sale. A particularly good attendance of buyers was present, who, realising the exceptional quality of the cows, bid freely for them, with the result that it was one of the best sales of cows in Co. Limerick this season. The best cows sold at from £29 to £32 10s., second best made from £24 10s. to £28, the remainder being sold at from £18 5s. to £23. Only one cow out of the entire bawn was sold under £20, the average price of the bawn being particularly good. The 15 in-calf heifers were also sold and these heifers, which were well brought out and in very satisfactory condition, sold freely, the best lots making from £25 to £28 10s. The second run made from £22 to £24, the remainder being sold at from £18 to £21. A few lots of two year old store cattle for another account were then auctioned and these sold at from £12 7s. 6d. to £16.

Other sales of dairy cows conducted by Mr. de Courcy previous to the Croom sale were:—
 At Drombanna, Ballyneety, for Mr. William Penny, where a very choice bawn of cows met good competition, the best cows being keenly bid for. The prices at this sale were:—Best cows, £27 to £32 10s.; seconds, £22 to £25 10s.; others, £18 10s. to £21 5s. In-calf heifers, £20 to £24. Bullocks and heifers, £20 10s. to £24 10s.

At Kilmurry, Castletroy, a bawn of cows sold for Mrs. Leonard at satisfactory prices.
 At Castlemungret, for Mr. John Bridgeman, consequent on the sale of his holding, there was good competition, dairy cows making from £19 5s. to £27. Two year old cattle, £14 5s. Yearlings, £8. Weanlings, £3. The grazing of these lands was then let for Messrs. Cement, Ltd., at from £9 15s. to £10 5s. per acre.

At Stone Holme, Shearin's Cross, Kilmallock, for Mr. Ryan, a bawn of cows were sold, best lots making £19 5s. to £20 15s., while second classes sold at £16 5s. to £17 10s.

At Ballycar, Ardnacrusha, a successful clearance sale was held for Mr. John Moloney, when the dairy cows, store cattle and farming implements were sold at good prices.
