

PROBATE ACTION FOX "MESMERISED"

LAST WILL UPHELD

In the High Court, Dublin, on Wednesday, the last will of the late Michael Walsh, farmer, Gurrane, Rath Luirc, Co. Cork, who died on July 10th, 1946, at the age of 89 years, was admitted to probate in solemn form. The will dated October 7th, 1942, had three later codicils added to it.

The application to have the will and codicils admitted to probate was brought by Mr. Roger Fox, solr., Kilmallock, as executor. Notice of intention to cross-examine witnesses had been served by Miss Susan Walsh, Lower Effin, Kilmallock, niece of the deceased author of the will. The estate, including a 48 acre farm, amounted to approximately £3,000.

Mr. T. K. Liston, S.C., who, with Mr. W. F. Roche, B.L. (instructed by Messrs. Roger Fox & Co., solrs.), appeared for Mr. Fox, said that under the will and codicils the late Mr. Walsh left £25 each to the Parish Priest and curate of Ballyhea; £100 each to his nephew, Patrick Walsh, and his two nieces, Kitty and Susan Walsh; and the residue in equal shares between the Rector of the Jesuit College, Mungret, Limerick, and the Rector of the Jesuit College, The Crescent, Limerick. When the will was being drafted, Mr. Walsh had told Mr. Fox that he was in Chicago in his youth and the Jesuit Fathers there had befriended and helped him.

Miss Susan Walsh was represented by Mr. M. Binchy, S.C., and Mr. G. A. Lee, B.L. (instructed by Mr. David Fleming, solr.).
