mitted breaking into a house in  
Kingscourt, Co. Cavan, on the 17th  
December, 1946.

The statement by accused went  
on to say:—

"I was told on this date—  
21/3/1947—by Detective Sergeant  
Murphy of a number of houses  
which were entered in the Counties  
Meath, Cavan, Louth, during the  
latter part of the month of Decem-  
ber, 1946, and also of a number of  
houses in the Counties Limerick,  
Clare and Cork, together with the  
names of the owners of the houses  
and from which cash, goods, and  
other articles were taken. I was  
also cautioned by Detective Sergt.  
Murphy that I was not obliged to  
say anything unless I wished to do  
so, and that anything I would say  
would be taken down in writing and  
may be used in evidence. I am now  
prepared to admit breaking and  
entering eight houses of the nine  
mentioned to me in the Counties  
Meath, Cavan and Louth, and  
aiding and abetting in the ninth  
house, which is in the Ardee area,  
and from which I was told that a  
£10 note was stolen from the pocket  
of a suit of clothes which, I under-  
stand, was found in the possession  
of the man I know as George and  
who has been charged with break-  
ing into the ninth house with me.  
I deny having taken a £10 note from  
the pocket of the suit of clothes in  
question, nor did I change a £10  
note in Ardee. I have already made  
statements admitting in all eleven  
cases of housebreaking in Counties  
Limerick and Clare, the names and  
addresses of the owners which  
were told to me by Detective  
Sergeant Murphy. In my first  
statement to you I admitted having  
broken into two houses in the Co.  
Cork only, but now I admit having  
broken into three houses—the third  
being Castlecor Post Office. This  
statement has been given to myself  
to read, and it is correct except in  
the offences committed in the  
Counties Limerick and Cork and  
Clare, which to be correct should  
read committed during the month  
of January, 1947."

The accused, as stated, was re-  
turned for trial in custody.

## OBITUARY

### MR. F. LYNCH, CAHERCONLISH

The death has occurred of Mr.  
Frank Lynch, Caherconlish, who  
was a noted hurler and a Gael of  
the first rank. He was an out-  
standing member of the Caherline  
G.A.A. Club, and played in many  
inter-county contests for his native  
Limerick. He was also one of the  
first to join the Old I.R.A., being  
then a mere youth. Following his  
capture by British military, he  
spent two years in Wormwood  
Scrubs and Dartmoor Prisons,  
where the seeds of his ill-health  
were sown.

A large concourse of comrades  
in the Old I.R.A. and sympathisers  
generally followed his remains  
from Inch St. Lawrence Church to  
the cemetery at his native village,  
Caherconlish. The "Last Post" was  
sounded at his graveside.
