

Maintenance of Live Stock (Ireland) Order THE Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Izeland, by virtue and exercise of the powers vested in them under the Maintenance of Live Stock Act, 1915, and for the purpose of maintaining a sufficient stock of animals, do hereby order as follows-

ANIMALS IN-CALF OR M.PIG NOT TO BE SLAUGHTERED OR EXPORTED. 1. An animal which is visibly or obviously in-call or in-pig shall not (a) be slaughtered, or be caused or permitted by its owner to be slaughtered; or (b) be moved out of Ireland, or be caused or permitted by its owner to be moved out of ireland.

EXCEPTIONS FROM RESTRICTIONS I The restrictions imposed by the foregoing. Article shall not apply to-(a) slaughter of an animal under the powers conferred by the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1884 to 1914, or any Order made thereunder; or (b) slaughter of an animal necessary or desirable on account of accidental injury to the animal or its iliness or (c) slaughter or movement out of Ireland of an animal if in the opinion of the Department the slaughter or movement out of Ireland is desirable for any exceptional reason or purpose and the slaughter or movement is authorised by a licence granted by the Department or officer of the Department.

POWERS OF INSPECTORS 2. Amy Veterinary Inspector of the Department or, subject to the direction of the Department, any Inspector of a Local Authority may enter any slaughterhouse or other promises on and examine any animals or carcases therein. REVOCATION.

4. The Slaughter of Animals (Ireland) Order of 1915 is hereby revoked.



The New Budget of Commons on yesterday by Mr M'KENNA, the Chancellor of the Exchequer. The proposals it contains are truly staggering in so far as they emphasize the appalling amount of money required to Anance the terrible war, which I shaking human society to its very foundations. They are, however, remarkable under the circumetance for the comparative lightness with which they press on industrial or commercial life or interfere with the necessaries of the people. No doubt they add, as was only to be expected, to the already severe burdens caused by the awful conflict in gress, but, in view of the facts, they are much less irksome and crushing than any one except these who were thoroughly well ' in the know " could have anticipated. The Chanceller has to find £1,805,500,000 during the coming year, and of that coloseal total £1,589,090,000 is to be devoted to the horrible work of human destruction and devastation All this enormous amount obviously cannot be raised by immediate taxation, and so the Budget provides not for the entire sum but for a revenue of £502,000,000. The new duties, it means discriminate unfairly against Ireland, for with a few exceptions they are essentially taxes on laxary. One of the principal points a connection with them is an increase of income tax. The new rate on carned in somes up to £500 will be 2s 3d in the £ instead of 2s 1 1-5d as new. Between £800 and £1,000 a year the rate will rise from the present scale to 2s 6d, and by successive stages this scale is carried up to 5s when the total income excoeds £2,500 a year. On uncarned incomes the new scale will begin at Ss on incomes not exoseding £300, and will rise by stages of 6d to is, which will be paid on incomes exceeding £2,000. All these charges are subject to existing statutory allowances and abatements. There will be no change in the rate of Super-Tax. There will be a graduated tax on tickets or entrance fees charged for amasements, insluding theatres, cinemas, football matches and races, rising from id on ild or under to it every additional 10s. Railway tickets are also | P m. to be taxed. There will be no tax on journeys costing 9d, but on all fares from 8d to 1s a tax of 1d will be charged, with an additional penny for every additional shilling or part of a shill ing. This impost will naturally hit Ireland than England for the ber of train journeys per head

the population in this country is far below that in England. The Impost that will probably prove most unwelcome to Ireland will be that en angar, on which an additional tax of id per ib is being placed. It is said, however, that many members of the House of Commons deduced from Mr M'Knana's statement on yesterday in reference to this particular item ' that the market abroad would have to bear the added half-penny." The ecoos tax will be raised from lid to 5d, and coffee and chicory from 3d to 6d. On matches there will be a new Customs duty of 3% 64, and an Excise duty of 3s 4d per 10,000, or a duty of 4d on 1,000 matches. Mineral waters are to be taxed, ranging from 4d per gallon on table water pre pared with sugar or fermented; 8d per galion en all others. The tax on cider and perry will be id per gallon. The duty on motor cars not exceeding 16 horse power will be doubled, and on higher cars trebled. Motor cycles not exceeding four horse power will pay 2 guineas, and above four horse power three quarters of

the duty chargeable on motor cars of like horse power. The excess profits tax will be raised from 50 per cent to 60 per cent. WAR PROBLEMS FOURTH LENTEN LECTURE IN AUGUSTINIAN

Another Powerful Discourse by Rev. Dr. Murphy, O.S.A.

In continuation of his series of Lenten Lectures in the Augustinian Church, Rev Dr Marphy, O S A, delivered his fourth discourse on last Sunday evening before a very large congregation. He dealt with the subject of the "Problems of the War," and took the following for his text :-

Therefore do not thou pray for this people, nor take to thee praise and supplication fer them, and do not withstand me, for I will not hear thee. Seest thou not what they do in the cities of Juda and in the streets of Jerusalem. . . . And thou shall speak to them these words, but they will not hear thee, and thou chalt call them and they will not answer thee. And thou shall say to them : this is a nation which bath not hearkened to the Voice of the Lord their God, nor received instruction : faith is lost, Jer, sap vii. vers 16, 17, 27, 28.

COURT Supposed Lost Document In the Probate Court on Monday, before Mr Justice Madden, the application respecting the estate of the late Mr Benjamin H Lane, solicitor, Limerick, was listed for judgment. 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
