MRS. M. KELLY, ATHEA.

It is with feelings of regret we record the death of Mrs. Mary Margaret Kelly, which occurred at her residence, Athea, on Wednesday of last week. She had reached the venerable age of ninety-one, and, up to a few years ago, when she was sprightly than many people twenty years her junior. Of a lively spirit and cheery disposition, she was possessed of a boundless generosity and as "Manie Peggy," she was semi-invalided, as a result of accidental injury, she was more widely known and affectionately esteemed. For well nigh seventy years her pleasant personality pervaded her well-known licensed premises with an old world charm and hospitable atmosphere. Her plentiful pub was a happy haven to legions of thirsty travellers, and many was the "hang-over" she always readily relieved. She could claim relationship to almost one half of the parish, and full friendship to the other half—all of whom mourn her passing and tender their sympathy to her bereaved family. Her large funeral to Templeathea was a fitting final tribute to a grand little old lady, who was small of stature but big of heart.
