MR. NICHOLAS BROWNE, HOLY- CROSS, KILMALLOCK.

The death took place recently at
Holycross, Kilmallock, of Mr. Nich-
olas Browne. The deceased gentle-
man, who resided in Africa for a
number of years, was a member
of a well-known and highly popu-
lar North Cork family from Meelin
who played an important part in
the struggle for national independ-
ence, one of whom, Mr. Dan
Browne, now of Thomastown, Kil-
mallock, was on active service with
the Republican forces and took part
in most of the engagements against
the British Crown forces in North
Cork, West Limerick and North
Kerry during the 1920-'21 period.

The funeral to the family burial
ground was large and representa-
tive of both clergy and laity. The
chief mourners were:—Very Rev.
Canon Browne, London; Tim
Browne, Meelin, and Dan Browne,
Thomastown, Kilmallock (broth-
ers); Miss Katie Browne, Holycross,
