Though there was a big list of cases for hearing at the Limerick Civil Bill Court on Monday last, a strange feature of the proceedings was that all the civil bill claims and ejectments, due to be defended, were adjourned to the next sitting of the Court on June 7th.

One solicitor appearing in a few of the cases was unable to attend the court and, accordingly, adjournments were granted.
