The defendant told the Justice that he would not trespass there again if given another chance.

MR. O'DONNELL SAID THAT HE HAD GIVEN AN UNDERTAKING BEFORE NOT TO TRESPASS.

Mr. O'Donnell said that he had given an undertaking before not to trespass.

DEATH OF REV. BRO. HUGH LYNCH, F.S.C.

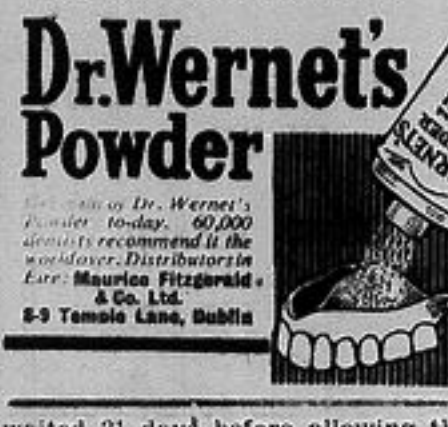

waited 21 days before allowing the trees to be cut. Actually he only waited from 4th to 13th February before allowing the trees to be cut by the other three defendants, to whom he sold the trees. Replying to Mr. Cussen, witness agreed that at the time in question the weather was the worst experienced for many years. Mr. Cussen said that turf was in very short supply at the time and defendant cut a few trees for himself as he was running short of fuel. When the other defendants, who were neighbours, saw him they asked him for a few trees and he gave them the trees. Michael McCoy bore out Mr. Cussen's statement and said he sold the trees for prices ranging from 50/- to 28/- each. Mr. Cussen-Conditions became so bad around this time that the Minister revoked the Order. The Justice dismissed the summonses under the Probation Act. AUCTIONEERS ACT. The Justice announced that applications under the New Auctioneers Act would be dealt with at Newcastle West Court on 20th June.
