MRS. C. WALSH, ENNISCOUCH.

The death of Mrs. Catherine Walsh, which occurred at her residence, Enniscouch, Rathkeale, on Sunday, the 11th inst., removes another strong link with past history in this county. A typical, kindly and good hearted Irish woman, she had many admirable traits of character that made her beloved by those who knew her. She was the widow of the late James Walsh. Both herself and her husband had a consistently patriotic outlook and supported every national movement from the early days of the land war down to the latest fight for Irish freedom, when, true to a fine tradition, three of her sons took an active part in that campaign. Michael and Ned (for some time M.C.C.) were out with the East Limerick Flying Column and George was with the West Limerick Brigade. Their importance in the fight might be evidenced from the fact that the paternal home of their father in Glenroe was destroyed by the Black and Tans.

The remains were removed to St. Mary's Church, Rathkeale, on Monday evening and the funeral, which was of large dimensions, took place to the adjoining cemetery on Tuesday.

PALLAS COURT

Trees Cut Without Permit

UNBURIED CARCASSES

At Pallasgreen Court on Tuesday last, before District Justice D. F. Gleeson, B.L.,

The Minister for Lands summoned Thomas Slattery, Ballyvalode, Oola, for unlawfully cutting down four trees in the centre of his farm, each tree at that time being more than ten years old, and in respect of which notice was not given 21 days before commencement of such cutting down.

Mr. J. J. Power, State Solicitor, prosecuted, and Mr. P. G. Collins, solicitor, appeared for the defendant, and pleaded guilty on his behalf.

Guard Collins, in evidence, said that he called on the 11th December to the premises of the defendant, where he observed a number of trees cut on the road and on his lands. He went to the defendant, who stated that he received notice from the County Council ganger to cut down the trees on the roadside. When witness proceeded into the lands he saw four sycamore trees cut but no notice was got for these. Defendant explained to witness that the timber was cut for firewood and sold to the poor in the district.

Mr. Collins said that the defendant was 74 years and could not attend the Court that day. One of the trees was small, and was down in a quarry. There was a demand at the time for firewood, and he sold it to the poor. It was his first offence ever.

A fine of 2/6 in respect of each of the four trees was imposed.

UNBURIED CARCASSES.

John Lonergan, Clonlusk, Doon, was summoned by Guard Farrell, for knowingly and without reasonable cause permitting the carcasses of cattle belonging to him to remain unburied in a field to which dogs had access, contrary to Section 6 of the Dogs Act, 1906.

Guard Farrell said that the carcasses of 15 cattle were deposited on the defendant's field at Clonlusk, and they were lying there, unburied, for six months.

Justice (to defendant) — What have you to say?

Defendant—I had them there for feeding greyhounds.

Justice—What killed the cattle; did they die?—Yes, they died during the month of April.

The Guard added that the defendant skinned the animals. They were not actually his own, as he had got them from other people.

Defendant said they were given to him for the dogs.

In reply to the Justice, Guard Farrell said that there was a smell off the place where the carcasses lay.

The Justice said it was a scandalous business and it would have to stop. The defendant must dispose of the dead animals in a hygienic way, otherwise all the dogs around would be attracted to the place.

A fine of £2 was imposed.

LORRY PROSECUTION.

Francis Strumble, Oatrath, Cahir, Co. Tipperary, was summoned by Guard Collins for having no mirror on a motor lorry, no white light, and no rere red lamp.

Guard Collins gave evidence of questioning the defendant, with regard to the offences, at Cluggin, Oola, on the 14th April.

The defendant, who did not appear, was fined 20/- for having no mirror, and 5/- in each of the other summonses.

COTTAGE POSSESSION.

The Limerick County Council sought possession of a cottage, on the grounds of overholding, from William Hilliard, Gurtnagard, Cappamore.
