

LIMERICK has been afforded a fine exampleas a report published in our columns on Friday last showed -of what mediation can do to obviate trouble and annoyance in the world of trade and industry. The City Carpenters made a demand on the Master Builders' Assoclation for an increase in their rate of pay and negotiations in connection with the matter immediately ensued. The employers and men met in conference in the Chamber of Commerce to discuss the question, and after deliberating for two hours falled to come to any agreement Like the wise and practical people they proved themselves to be, however, they agreed to submit what was in dispute to arbitration and to ask the Most Rev Dr O'DWYKR, Bishop of the Diocese, to arbitrate, his decision to be accepted as binding on both parties. His Lordship, who has always been a strong advocate of the prevention of strikes by the exercise of sweet reasonableness and a little mutual give and take, kindly consented to act. He met the representatives of both sides and, after going fully into all the details and points involved, made an equitable award, at which all concerned were fully satisfied. Thus was amicably settled what might otherwise develop into a dispute which would be a severe blow both to the workers and the employers and have disastrous consequences for the general interests of the city. The lesson to be drawn from the sensible action of the carpenters and the master builders and from the satisfactory result of the arbitration is that of the obvious advisability of aubmitting all matters of the kind to the decision of some party or parties in whom there oan unhesitatingly be general confidence a resert to them. consequences Limerick, like so many other places throughout the world, has had somewhat bitter experiences. Important Amendment to Finance Bill

An amendment of far-reaching importance for municipal authorities in Great Britain and Ireland was made in the Finance Bill in the House of Commons last week. Hitherto, owing to the financial demands of the war, the Treasury have maintained a very tight check upon the borrowing facilities of local authorities, and in consequence many public works of urgent necessity have had to be deferred. Mr Pennefeather, a Tory member, put down an amendment some days ago providing that municipal authorities in the United Kingdom should be allowed to raise any money which they may be authorised to borrow by means of the issue of securities or stock in the United States. Mr Matthew Keating has actively interested himself in the matter and has had interviews with Mr M'Kenna and Mr Montagu with a view of ensuring that Irish authorities should be entitled to share in this privilege if granted by the Treasury.
