N.A.C.A. NOTES

(By "ATILANG") County Championships. On Sunday at Kildimo the 1947 county championships will be decided, and once again they should provide another afternoon's enjoyment, packed with the uncertainties that make fixtures of this kind so interesting to the followers of athletics. Can the 1946 "champs" again come out on top? This is the question that only can be answered on Sunday evening. In the sprints W. Enright (Mungret A.C.) has a good chance of retaining his title, but in P. J. Kelly, G. Geary, T. Cleary (Limerick A.C.), O'Brien (Cappamore) and D. O'Brien and J. Conway (Kildimo) he has strong opposition. The quarter and half mile must find new holders, as L. Hurley (Kildimo), through injury, must be an absentee from these events, which he won at Adare last year. Of the eleven entries for these events, M. Brazier (Elton), the mile champion, and the local, Cahill, seem very fancy. The three miles flat should provide a win for some cross-country man and, therefore Greensmith (Ballinacety), O'Brien (Bruree), Caneen (Kilfinny), Leonard (Dhineen) and Kavanagh (Kildimo) all have an equal chance. P. A. Barry, J. Moran, M. Martin and J. O'Keefe dominate cycling matters, and at present any one of this quartette could score a victory. Jim Houlihan (Kilfinny) seems likely to win the weights this year, and in the jumps M. Brosnan, last season's pole and high champion, competes against Tom Wall, W. J. Corbett, former Irish champions, and Joe Sheehy, Jack Sheehy and twelve others will make the going very hot. The long jump is very open, but Brosnan and Corbett should be placed at the finish. Crough, last year's tug-o-war champions, and potential Munster champions, should again retain their title. Entries now total 86, and so only the very keenest competition can be expected on Sunday, when all parts of the county will be represented in the 1947 championships of Limerick. LATE REV. J. RYAN

Widespread Sympathy BISHOP PRESIDES AT REQUIEM MASS It is with feelings of very deep regret we record the death of Rev. John Ryan, elder son of Mrs. M. Ryan and the late Mr. P. J. Ryan, Main Street, Croom, which sad event took place rather unexpectedly at the residence of his mother on Wednesday of last week. The late Father Ryan received his primary education at Croom National Schools, from which he progressed to St. Munchin's Diocesan Seminary and thence to Maynooth, where, after a brilliant course, he was ordained in 1923 and appointed curate in Ardpatrick, from which, after some years, he went to the States. Returning to Ireland, which all during his life made an unquarable appeal to his affections, he continued his good work in the homeland. His health recently had given cause for some anxiety, but his death, which came rather unexpectedly, was a shock not only to his family but to the general public who had the pleasure and privilege of his acquaintance. To his mother and sisters and brother we extend with a full meed of condolence our deepest sympathy on the sorrow which has stricken them and the bereavement which they have suffered. A true patriot, a kindly, loving and lovable priest, by nature and training a gentleman, his loss will be felt and deeply deplored. Ar dheis De go raibh a nam. I nithian De go gearar e. When the sad news of his death became known, sympathisers from a wide area attended in great numbers to pay their last respects to their dead friend, and extend to his bereaved family their sincere sympathy at his passing. Woodroffe. JUNE'S HEAVY RAINFALL. For the third year in succession, there was a particularly high average of rainfall in June. Records just published reveal that there were only eight days last month on which no rain fell, and that the total rainfall during the month was slightly above that recorded for the same month in the past three years. The wettest day of the month was the 4th, when .65 inches of rain fell, slightly less than half the amount of rain for the entire month in 1944. June 1st, with 11 hours of sunshine, was the warmest day this year. BIG HAUL. Thieves broke into the premises to Messrs. FATALITY IN MILL VERDICT OF ACCIDENTAL DEATH At the adjourned inquiry held at the Courthouse, Kilrush, Tuesday, before Mr. D. J. Hillery, Coroner, and a jury, into the cause of the death of John Kiely, St. Joseph's Terrace, Kilrush, who was found dead on Friday morning on the ground floor of the flour mills of Messrs. M. Glynn & Sons, Patrick Hennessy said: "At 3 a.m. on Friday I saw deceased, a rollerman, going towards one of the machines. About twenty minutes later I went down to the basement to put out the new time cards, and when I arrived I saw a man under the drive wheel of the third break roll. I called Patrick Roughan, engine driver, and he stopped the mill. I saw Tommy Brien and Michael Morrissey take deceased from under the wheel and he appeared to be dead. I was unable to account for how deceased got under the wheel, but it was his business to see everything in the mill." A verdict of accidental death was returned.

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
