WIDELY REGRETTED

DEATH OF MRS. MULLINS, GLENDAAHEEN

Widespread regret has been occasioned by the news of the death of Mrs. Mary Jane Mullins, wife of Mr. William Mullins, Glendaheen, Kilcoleman, well known West Limerick farmer and member of the Committee of the Ardagh Co-Operative Creamery Society. Deceased lady belonged to an old and highly esteemed farming family, and was daughter of the late Robert and Mrs. Mulcahy, Drominbeesom, Newcastle West. She was sister of Mr. Con and Mr. Bob Mulcahy, Drominbeesom, and Mr. Tim Mulcahy, Connolly Terrace, Newcastle West. Deceased was also an aunt of Mr. Dan Mulcahy, Journalist, Newcastle West, and of Miss Essie Mulcahy, Librarian, do. The late Mrs. Mullins was formerly a member of the nursing staff of the former Newcastle West District Hospital. Deep sympathy will be extended to the sorrowing husband, son and daughters and to the other bereaved relatives.

The remains were removed to Kilcoleman Church on Wednesday evening, 9th inst., and there was a very large and representative attendance at the funeral, which took place to Ardagh Cemetery on Thursday, 10th inst. Rev. M. O'Grady, C.C., Newcastle West, assisted by Rev. Father O'Connell, C.C., Coolcappa, officiated at the graveside.

COMING AERIDHEACHT AT NANTENAN

Under the guidance of the Chairman, Rev. D. O'Donnell, P.P., the recently formed Branch of the Gaelic League at Cappagh will, as already advertised in the "Leader," hold a big aeridheacht in the demesne grounds at Nantenan on July 27th, through the courtesy of Mrs. White (writes our Rathkeale correspondent). The venue, in the midst of picturesque woodlands, is ideal for the purpose. The committee are busy preparing an attractive programme for the occasion, consisting of songs, dances and musical selections. A prominent worker in the Gaelic League will deliver the opening address.

July 27th is the date of the annual Patron of Nantenan and the usual facilities will be afforded to all who wish to pay rounds at the blessed well nearby.

Granted favourable weather, the "Patron" Day and aeridheacht combined should make a big day for Nantenan this year. The well and aeridheacht venue are not far from Rathkeale, on the road to Askeaton.

Bohan, and Miss E. A rider to the verdict expressed the opinion that suicidal patients if at all possible should be removed as quickly as possible to the Clare Mental Hospital, where surgical facilities for their treatment should be provided at the earliest moment.

TOOK SUDDENLY ILL

CO. LIMERICK BOY'S DEATH

Master L. Noonan (14), only son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Noonan, Bawn-tard, Kilmallock, took suddenly ill at his residence on Sunday evening and died shortly afterwards. He had been out hurling a short time before and had just returned to his parents' residence.

Dr. J. C. Ogilvie, Kilmallock, and Dr. M. J. O'Connor, Kilmallock, were quickly on the scene, but life was extinct. Death was due to haemorrhage, and upon the facts being conveyed to the Coroner (Dr. J. P. Clery, Hospital) an inquest was not considered necessary.

The deceased was nephew of Very Rev. M. Noonan, Pastor, Santiago Diocese, U.S.A., and of Very Rev. Patrick Noonan, Pastor, St. Joseph's Diocese, Missouri.

DIED ON WAY TO MASS

On Sunday last as Miss Mary Maher, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Maher, Derrycastle, accompanied by her sister and brother, was going to second Mass at Killaloe, she became ill when within 50 yards of the Church (writes our Killaloe correspondent). She was carried into the house of Mr. P. W. Ryan, Main Street. The Revd. P. Cluie, C.C., who immediately arrived, administered the last Sacraments. On the morning of her death she appeared to be in her usual health. Her brother drove his two sisters in a trap to Ballina and after stabling the horse there, they then proceeded across the bridge to Killaloe Church. Deepest sympathy is extended to the family on their sad bereavement.

Dr. Scanlon, Coroner, East Clare, held an inquest on Monday morning last, when a verdict of cardiac failure, in accordance with medical testimony, was returned.
