BUT WALKED TO HIS HOME

That deceased had walked home over a quarter of a mile while suffering from a fractured skull was stated at the inquest on Anthony Madden (67) Hazelpoint, Dromineer, Co. Tipperary, a well-known fisherman on local lake.

It was stated in evidence that deceased was cycling to Nenagh when he was in collision with a motor cycle driven by John Hogan, Garranfadda, who had his brother, James Hogan, as pillion rider. After reaching home, Madden walked around and complained of "an awful pain in the head" and went to bed. He was removed to hospital later where he died without regaining consciousness.

Dr. Sheila Murphy said death was due to fracture of the base of the skull and laceration of the brain.

The inquest was adjourned.
