FAMOUS IRISH STEP-DANCER PASSES

The death in London of Mr. Joseph Enright, of Moyvane, Co. Kerry, at an early age, has caused widespread regret to his many friends and dance pupils in North Kerry and North Limerick (writes our Glin correspondent). "Joe" was a famous step-dancer and dancing instructor, and was one time champion step-dancer of Ireland, as well as holder of many county championships, including those of Counties Kerry, Limerick, Tipperary and Kildare. He also gave various dancing exhibitions in many parts of Leinster. He was a very able instructor and his classes for many years throughout North Kerry and West Limerick were well attended, his pupils distinguishing themselves in competitions in many centres. He later went to England as adjudicator and remained there, making a name for himself and, winning many championships. He was well known in the Irish Clubs in England. He taught step-dancing and music (the violin) at Wealdstone Stadium. He was a native of Moyvane, Co. Kerry, a place which has produced famous dancers in olden and modern times. He was brother of Mr. Timothy Enright, G.L., of Glin L.D.F., to whom and his family deepest sympathy is offered.
