CHILD DROWNED IN POOL

The danger of parents taking their children to bogs, when working at turf production, was emphasised by Dr. P. Stokes, coroner, South Tipperary, at an inquest in Killenaule (Thurles) on Norah M. Kennedy, aged about three years, daughter of Denis Kennedy, Glen-goole. The child was drowned in a pool beside a boghole. Bogs, said the Coroner, were no places for young children.

Guard Harkin, Thurles, gave evidence that he was working on the bog and heard a scream. It was that of Mrs. Kennedy, mother of the child. The child had been rescued and he applied artificial respiration for over half an hour, when the doctor took over.

Dr. R. Sheehan, medical officer, Killenaule, stated that he applied cardiac and respiratory stimulants but without effect.
