





He did not think that Sir John had suggested, or intenled to suggest, that the man who started the rising were men who desired murder. Sir John was not an expert witness but a soldier, and a soldier used terms of speech which more adroit persons could easily avoid. Major Price, he understood, was intelligence officer of the Irish Command (A Nationalist member - Without intelligence). Not having an opportunity of going into the subject with any of Major Price's military superiors, or with any of the civil authorities, he was obviously not in a position to form an independent judgment. A specific charge against, Major Price had been made. The charge made by Mr M Neill against Major Price was almost of extreme gravity, but it would not be wise for any Minister to dismiss an officer in a case i n which there was so much conflict of testimony. The matter would not rest where it was. He wanted to find out the facts if he could. In conclusion he agreed that the real question was not who was going to administer martial law for a few days or few weeks. The real question was how could they bring Ireland, not from the oppression of martial law-for of real oppression there was none-but from the stigms of martial law that existed. 

John was not an expert witness but a soldier and a soldier used terms of speech which more adroit persons could easily avoid. Major Price, he understood, was intelligence officer of the Irish Command (A Nationalist member—With-

out intelligence). Not having an opportunit of going into the subject with any of MAJO Price's military superiors, or with any of the civil authorities, he was obviously not in position to form an independent judgment. A specific charge against Major Price had been made. The charge made by Mr M Netil against Major Price was almost of extreme gravity, but it would not be wise for any Minister to dismiss an officer in a case in which there was so much conflict of testimony. The matter would not rest where it was. He wanted to find out the facts if he could. In conclusion he agreed that the real question was not who was got to administer martial law for a few days or few weeks. The real question was how could they bring Ireland, not from the oppression of martial law-for of real oppression there was none—but from the stigms of martial law that existed. That was the question to which he had devoted his time, and to which he would continue to devote his time, whatever labour was required, in a sympathetic desire that as coon as possible the stigms should be wish-
