The expression " Motor Car " means a car-riage propelled by Mechanical Power, and includes a Motor bicycle and a Motor tricycle, but does not include a vehicle drawn by a Motor Car. These duties do not apply to any Motor Car, Motor Omnibus or other Vehicle being a hackney carriage within the mean.
Ing of Section 4 of the Customs and Inland

liable to the payment of any of the above
Duties are required by the Acts to fill up and sign a Declaration which is to be delivered to the proper Officer before the expiration of the Month of January or before the expiration of twenty one days from the date when such persons shall first incur liability. The Penalty for not delivering a Declaration or for making an untrue Declaration is £20. A Penalty of £20 (over and above the Duty) is also incurred by every person keeping a Motor Car without having taken out the Licence required by Law. Forms of declaration may be obtained at any Money Order Office in Ireland. In order, however, that the proceeds of Motor Licences may go to the credit of the County of Limerick, it is necessary that application for a Licence should be made to the Kilmalleck Post Office (not to the G.P.O., Limerick), as Kilmallock is the only Office authorised to issue Licenses for the County of Limerick.

CHARGE

One of the Greatest Feats of the

Writing on Sunday of the great fight for Ginchy, Mr W Beach Thomas, the Daily Mail's special correspondent with the British Army in the Field, says :- The scarred woods and desolate villages and honeycombed fields be hind Ginchy yesterday evening recked of gas fumes through which the queues and groups of prisoners trapesed wiping their eyes. In a lesperate attempt to arrest the fire of our guns and temporarily check the march of the supports, tear shells were plentifully rained over the countryside. Some of these prisoners had tasted both varieties of gas-ours and their own-within an hour or so. One man I spoke with, a Bavarian whose unit had fought well, had been driven by gas and explosives out of his trenches into the hospitality of No Man's Land and its gental shell holes. There he was cut off by a patrot and presently marched back through the sugary fumes of German weeping gas. He tasted, indeed, the full sayour of war between the hours of four and six yesterday evening. Nevertheless, he knew little of this sort of battle in which he had fought, for he was captured early at the very fringe of the battle front. As an historical and human event the capture of Ginchy is one of the great feats of arms of the war. It was the last ervation post of high tactical value left to the Germans on our battle front. Men marked it as the scene of a famous battle long before the final moment came, and wrestled for the privilege of sharing in the glory. Three servants at the headquarters of the attacking troops left their domestic duties, announcing it a note left behind them that they had missed the storming of Guillemont and must at al costs be in at the death of Ginchy. This sort of spirit filled the storming troops, though many of them were at the end of the week of fighting and slow endurance of desperate shell ing. On another part of the steading two out houses are used as "dining rooms," with boxes and other farm implements as tables. Opposite these rooms was an evilsmelling manure heap, and on the intervening passage is a pile of smouldering cinders on which the food is cooked, no fireplace or slove being available, The boys and girls buy their own food, and their mexis usually consist of tea and bread and butter, with an occasional supply of potatoes, which, we understand, are given another room in which six of the girls sleep. 




