Important Points for Farmers

The Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction has issued the following important lesson by Mr James M Adams, dealing with the question of the feeding of pigs with uncooked food, and of the comparative importance to farmers and pig feeders, because effected plainly and effectively with a question which is really a great liability. AND MR. JOHN MacNEILL  
Discussion in the House of  
Commons

Mr. LONDON, in the House of Commons on Wednesday, asked the following question:—Whether inquiry has been made into the charges made by Mr. John MacNeill against the Major in the case of the 10th Hussars in a position to state the nature of the inquiry and its result; and whether any evidence has been brought forward to show what further steps in the matter he proposes to take.
