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
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

STUPENDOUS FIGURES HUGE COST OF WAR Statement by the Prime Minister

NEW VOTE OF CREDIT The Prime-Minister, in the House of Commonson Wednesday, moved a Vote of Credit of £300,000,000 for the purposes of the war, this being the fourth Vote for the current financial year. It brings the total so voted for the year to £1,350,000,000 He stated that the aggregate amount since the outbreak of war sometioner by 13 Votes, is £3,132 000,000. Since the outbreak of war Parliament has sanctioned Votes, apart from peace expenditure, for a sum rather more than the aggregate of the national expenditure in the 20 years 1894 to 1913, a period which included the South African War. The average of expenditure from the previous Vote of Credit was at the rate of £5,000,000 per day, and he did not think that they the last Voce of Credit had been-Navy, Army, and Munitions, £284,500,000 ; Loans to Allies and Dominions, £96,000,000; Food Supplies, Hallways, and Miscellaneous Items, £10,000,000, or a total of £390,500 000.
