





Interesting Cases Before the UNDER MILITARY SERVICE ACT KING'S BENCH JUDGMENT

The Defendant Discharged Judgment in the Military Service case of the King v John Jones was delivered on Wednes-day in the King's Bench by the Lord Chief Jus-tice and Mr Justice Gibson. It was an appeal manding the troops at Limerick, to produce the defendant, John Jones, who had been arrested on a charge of being a desector from the army within the meaning of the Army Act, 1881, and the Military Service Act, 1916 It was contended that Jones went to England in June, 1914, to temporary employment in order to qualify for a position in an Insurance Company in Ireland. It was admitted that he had registered at Wandsworth, where he was residing, under the first of the Military Service Acts. He came back to enter into employment in Ireland in December, 1915, and was arrested by the Constabulary as a deserter at Kilteely on 11th September last and was, subsequently committed to military custody by Mr St George, R M. THE CASE OF MR. WALSHE KILLALOE

MEMORIAL TO LORD LIEUTENANT

At Saturday's meeting of the Limerica County Council, at which Mr W R Gubbins, J P (chairman), presided, the following resoution was proposed by Mr P K Hogan, seconded by Mr T W W Bennett, J P, and passed unanimously-"That we, the members of the Limerick County Council, baving heard the memorial about to be forwarded to your Excellency, Lord Wimborne, re the dismissal of Mr Michael Walshe from his position of national teacher of Killaloe, respectfully submit that the punishment is out of all proportion to the offence, and consequently we humbly request that your Excellency would exercise your prerogative of seeing this teacher restored to his position. The following is a memorial forwarded to the

Lord Lieutenant and which was also read at "To His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant and Governor General of Iceland,

"The memorial of the undersigned humbig sheweth-That Mr Michael Walshe was for upwards of 33 years National Teacher of Killalor and was qualified as of first division of first grade for upwards of thirty years during which period he has been teaching in the same school. That in 1906 Mrs W B Walshe, wife of the said Michael Walshe, acquired a lease of a ticensed premises in Killalos, That Mr Walshe was informed that it was Hoensed premises. That Mrs Walshe, by deed premises to Kliza Walshe. That the said Kiza Walshe neglected to take the necessary procoolings to have the licence transferred to her, and same remained in Mrs Walsh's usue until October, 1915. That in October, 1915, the said Kliza Walshe by agreement aubilet the pramines to Miss Annie Molloy. - That on the application of Miss Molloy for a transfer of the Reence the County Court Judge decided that the application was irregular, as the licence was in the name of Mrs Walshe. a memorial was forwarded to your Excellency notting out the facts and your Excellency granted liberty to trade until January, 1916, when a new licence was granted at Quarter Sessions to Miss Molloy. That in 1910 Mr. Walsh sequired the fee simple of licensed premises attached to but structurally separated vised by his soliciter that by so doing he would the not commit a breach of Rule SS (a), and that it was not necessary for him to disclose the purchase although he promptly and voluntarity disclosed the facts when requested to do so by the Commissioners of National Education, That he was depressed from the first division of the first grade to the second grade from November, 1910, for circumstances alleged against him as to the ownership of the licensed premises. That on an appeal for reconsideration of this decision his salary was withdrawn from him from 30th June, 1916, without any notice whatever. That he would have been entitled to retire voluntarily on a pension on the 10th July, 1917. That this pension was earned by upwards of thirty three years of unblemished service the reports on his work during all that period being uniformly good. That this punishment, dopriving him of his situa tion as principal teacher of Killshoe National School, involving as it does the loss of his pension is the severest in the power of the Commissloners of National Education to inflict, and your memorialists submit that if the facts were properly placed before them they would be more considerate towards an official of such long service and unblemished character. 


