

The Justice said he would make it his business to see that some provision was made for O'Driscoll before he left prison next time. It was useless trying to accommodate him after he had left prison. He impressed on the defendant the facility with which he could get work anywhere in this country were he so inclined. The present charges were so serious that he would have to send him to prison for four months on each charge, the sentences to run concurrently.

DEATH OF MR. J. WALKER

With deep regret we announce the death of Mr. James Walker, who passed away at an advanced age, on Wednesday, 26th inst., at his residence, Kleinberg, South Circular Road, Limerick. A native of Newcastle West, where his people were long and honourably associated with the business life of the town, he was for many years managing clerk of the firm of Messrs. William Leahy and Son, solicitors, Limerick. Highly respected by all classes, he was widely read and cultured and was of an exceedingly kind and good-hearted nature. He had a fine sense of humour and was in general of a very cheerful and social disposition. He had travelled extensively, having made it a practice for many years to take an annual holiday in different countries on the Continent and even in the United States and Canada. The remains were removed on Wednesday night to St. Michael's Church, where Requiem Mass was offered up yesterday morning, the funeral taking place later in the day to Churchtown Cemetery, Newcastle West.
