that the hospital be staffed exclusively by lay nurses or, alternately, by a body of nursing nuns. The County Council objected to the Minister's proposal, maintaining that the hospital should be

staffed by lay nurses, subject to the control of a small group of nuns. The Council were of the opinion that if the Minister's proposals were given effect to nuns would be excluded from the hospital, as it would not be possible for any religious community to provide a body of 120 nursing sisters—the number required for the staffing of the hospital. The deputation put these points

in his reply, said that there appeared to be considerable misunderstanding as to his attitude on this question. It was his considered opinion that there would be more efficiency if the hospital could be fendant. administered exclusively by either lay nurses or nursing sisters. But that was nothing more than an expression of opinion and in conveying that opinion to the County Council he was not giving any specific direction. If the County Council did not
