### DEATH OF MR. PATRICK HANNON

The unexpected death of Mr. Patrick Hannon, Donnellan's Buildings, Prospect, Limerick, which took place this morning, has caused keen sorrow amongst a large number of citizens, especially in sporting circles. "Paddy" was a truly popular citizen, inoffensive as a child and incapable of a harsh thought of his fellow-man. In his early years he was a popular member of the Lansdowne Rugby Football Club, and was, in fact, the last player to occupy the position of captain of the senior team. For many years he was an oarsman of outstanding ability in St. Michael's Club, being also coach to the Dramatic Class attached to the Society. He took a keen interest in soccer, being one of those who helped to popularise the game in Limerick. The late Mr. Hannon was attached to the Irish Assurance Company in Limerick and retired on pension only some months ago. In his business affairs, as in social life, he enjoyed the confidence and respect of all who knew him. The remains will be removed to St. Michael's Church this (Monday) evening at 8 o'clock, and the funeral will take place to-morrow (Tuesday) to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery at 3 o'clock.
