## DEATH OF MR. ANGUS MACKAY.

The *Irish Times* says:—"It is with feelings of deep regret we have to announce the death of Mr. Angus MacKay, a highly esteemed member of our reporting department. Mr. MacKay had for many years past held a leading position in ranks of Dublin Journalists. Commencing as a junior reporter in Dublin, to which he came from King's County, where his first newspaper work was done in this country, he made rapid advancement in his profession, and soon established himself as a descriptive writer of remarkable power. For nearly twelve months past his health had been failing, and though it was known that his constitution had been seriously undermined by repeated assaults of illness, his death which took place yesterday (Tuesday) morning at his residence, 23, O'Connell avenue, came as a painful shock to his numerous friends."

[We may add that perhaps the first position he occupied in this country after coming here from Scotland some twelve years ago was that of reporter on the staff of the *Limerick Chronicle*. Here he gave proof of those exceptional abilities which he later on quickly developed in the metropolis. He was a young gentleman of varied attainments, and one of his special fortes was in regard to musical matters, in which he took a deep and most intelligent interest. His kindly, genial disposition and never-failing courtesy, won for him the highest esteem of his colleagues here, and of a wide circle of friends who followed with interest a singularly successful career, now, alas, brought to a close. All the Dublin papers yesterday referred in feeling terms to the untimely demise of a brilliant young journalist, and a true and sincere friend.—*Ed. L. C.*]

## CHANCERY DIVISION

[Before the Vice-Chancellor  
Walsh v Walsh.

The action was brought by Ann Walsh and others to have a declaration in and a writ of habeas corpus issued, dated 27th April, 1893, declared void as against the plaintiffs; indenture cancelled; and for an order for the return of rents and profits of certain premises dealt with in the indenture. It appeared that one John O'Donnell, deceased, Limerick, by his will left all the real estate he possessed to the defendant, John Walsh, his heirs and assigns, and that he had bequeathed to certain legatees to the plaintiffs a sum of £1,421, which the defendant got possession of, all the plaintiffs alleged that the defendant had not duly administered the assets, and that the defendant should lodge in court the sum of £1,421 within a week, and for the order he was imprisoned for £100. In 1897 a writ of sequestration was issued against the defendant for the purpose of enforcing payment of the £1,421, and the writ was rendered ineffectual by the defendant's failure to execute of an indenture made in April, 1893, by which the defendant placed his property in trust for the benefit of the plaintiffs. The plaintiffs alleged that this deed was made for the purpose of preventing the £1,421 from being made available for payment of the £1,421 due under O'Donnell's will. Under these circumstances the plaintiffs sought to set aside the indenture and to have the defendant removed from possession of the property. It appeared that the defendant had made away with all the real estate except some house property in Limerick, and that he was in reference to this part of O'Donnell's will. In the present proceedings were brought the defendant alleged that owing to his illness he was not appearing, the sum found against him largely in excess of the real assets, and that certain payments he had made out of the £1,421 were also alleged that the deed was not fraudulent.
