MASSY, J.P.

The county of Limerick has lost by the death of Mr John Bolton Massy one of its ablest and most useful public men. Mr Massy resided in a portion of the county most remote from the city. and it was not often that he visited Limerick seldom, indeed, except on public business. As a member of the Grand Jury he was remarkable for his sound sense and excellent business qualities, and when selected to act as foreman the Grand Jury knew they were sure of the wisest guidence. He was one of the most generous landlords in the county, and though he resided in the very midst of one of the most troubled districts of Munster, there was never the slightest sign of friction between him and his tenants. He was as fine a specimen of the cultured county gentleman as could seen anywhere. During his course of study in Trinity College he exhibited brilliant scholarship and concluded his career with obtaining a gold medal at his Degrees. He always took great interest in Church affairs since the Disestablishment. He was one of the Diocesan Trustees for the Diocese of Cashel, was Lay Diocesan Nominator, a member of the Finance Committee of the Diocese, and a member of the General Synod.
