THE LATE REV W. E. MASSY.—Although the connexion of the late Rev William Eyre Massy with the Limerick Diocese was practically severed some eight years ago, yet his numerous friends will learn of his death with regret. Eight years ago Mr Massy got a stroke of paralysis, which rendered him unfit for the discharge of his parochial duties. After a long and severe illness he recovered sufficiently well to be able to go about, but the effects of the seizure remained. During the past year his health failed, and on Friday morning he quietly passed away, at his residence, Monkstown, Co. Cork. The Rev Mr Massy graduated in 1840, was ordained in 1843, and after holding several posts in the Diocese was elected rector of Newcastle in 1872, which post he held till 1882, when he resigned. In 1874 he was appointed Canon of Killeedy by the Lord Bishop. Mr Massy belonged to a family well known and highly popular in the County Limerick. In private life he was respected and looked up to by all who knew him. He was amiable, kindly, and single-minded, a true friend, and a faithful adviser. As a clergyman, Mr Massy was devoted to his duty, and in many respects a model of what a clergyman ought to be. Many who hear of his death will recall the memory of one who in all his relations in life was an honourable gentleman and a faithful minister.
