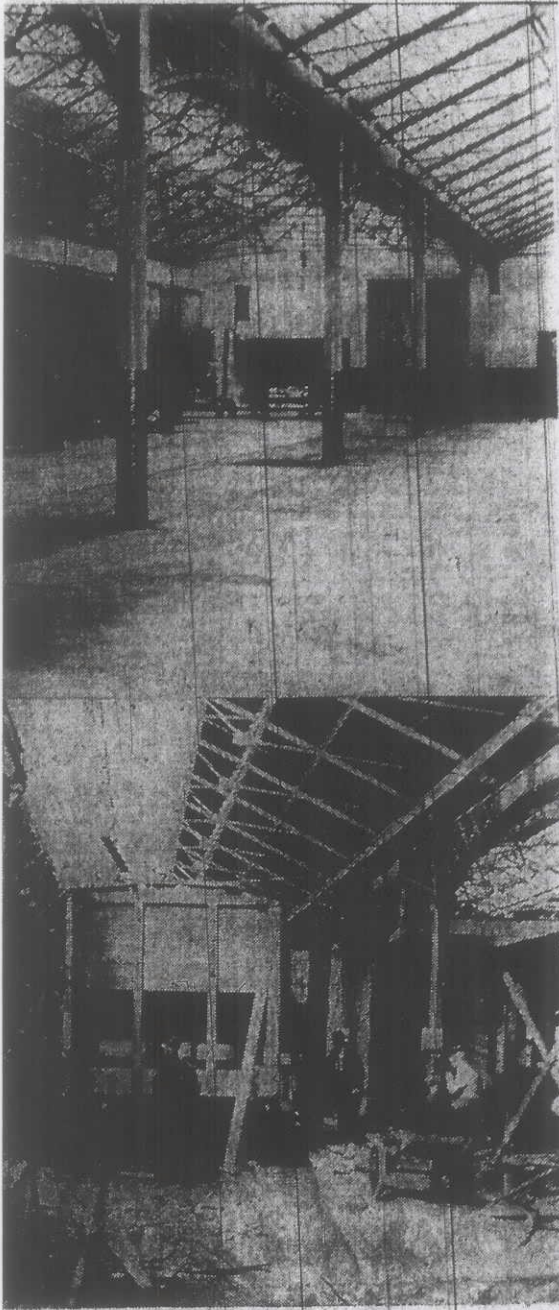

EFFORT TO DEPRIVE CITY OF ADMIRAL

Kilrush is trying to deprive Limerick of its Admiral of the Shannon!

At a recent meeting of the Kilrush Harbour Board, strong protests were made against the title of Admiral of the Shannon being held by the Mayor of Limerick. It was claimed that the jurisdiction of the Limerick Harbour Commissioners did not extend beyond Beale's Rock, which is about five miles from Limerick.

It should interest those people over the Shannon, and we would like to take a poor view of Mrs. Condell coming down here and asserting that right. If, however, she comes down on an excursion as Mayor of Limerick she will be welcomed as guest and with the dignity due to her office."

NO ARRANGEMENTS
Prior to the protest by the Kilrush Harbour Board, the Mayor, in an interview with a Limerick Leader reporter said that she had made no arrangements for the throwing of the dart and had not thought of it.

It is also a fact that the customs port of Limerick extends out to Loophead and beyond—to either side of the mouth of the Shannon and beyond.

At the meeting in Kilrush it was also stated that the title was a relic of British rule and a spurious one. There, again, much of the legal code in the Republic at the present time is based on English laws!

OBJECTING STRONGLY

At the Kilrush meeting, the Chairman of the Board, Mr. John Fennell, said they were objecting strongly to the Mayor of Limerick claiming jurisdiction over the estuary of the Shannon.

He maintains that the authority of the Limerick Harbour Commissioners does not extend beyond Beale's Rock and they had no authority from that to Loop Head. "From Beale's Rock on," he said, "the navigation lights are maintained by the Commissioners for Irish Lights."

He continued: "If the people of Limerick had their way there would be no port in Kilrush. The title of Admiral of the Shannon is only a spurious title, and anyway Mrs. Condell will be only perpetuating a British custom initiated by some foreign landlord who merely wanted a free day's outing on the river at the expense of the people of Limerick."

"We are protesting," he said, "against the right of the Mayor and the Limerick Harbour Commissioners claiming jurisdiction

remanded robbery charge Three months for stealing cylinder

Stephen McCarthy, 1 Old Francis Street, Limerick, was sentenced to three months imprisonment with hard labour at Limerick City Court today, when he pleaded guilty before Justice D. F. Gleeson to stealing a copper cylinder, value £22 13s. 9d., and the property of James O'Donnell, at Little Ellen Street, on July 20.

Inspector J. Bailey, prosecuting, said that defendant entered the premises and took the cylinder, which he broke up into scrap and sold it to a scrap dealer. Defendant had previous convictions.

The defendant said that he only got £2 8s. for the scrap.

Mr. B. Geary, s.d.r., defending, made a plea for leniency, saying that defendant had been out of work for some time.

A bond of £20 and two sureties of £10 or one of £20 was fixed in the event of appeal.

Det. Sergt. J. O'Sullivan gave evidence in the case.

Defendants were remanded a week at Limerick City Jail when they appeared for charge of robbing Thomas the sum of £87-4-9 at Ennis Road, Limerick, 4 last.
