Russia And Italian Peace Treaty

Tinkers, Move On!

The bye-law framed recently by the City Council with the object of controlling the parking of caravans within the limits of the County Borough is now in operation.

Under this bye-law caravans or other temporary dwellings cannot be set up in any street or roadway, or within a distance of 300 yards from the centre of any street or readway.
