COUNCILLOR JACK BOURKE is the new Mayor of Limerick. In a tension-packed election at the County Courthouse to-day his name was drawn from a hat by schoolboy Dermot Morris after he and Ald. S. Coughlan (Lab.) had each received eight votes. Clr. J. Carew was not present due to illness:

The new Mayor is aged 36 and is a native of Dublin. He has been a member of Limerick City Council since June of last year. He was proposed by Clr. J. P. Liddy and seconded by Clr. P. Kiely. Ald. Coughlan, the only other candidate, was proposed by Ald. M. Lipper and seconded by Clr. F. Leddin.

The election at 12.35 ended a morning of uncertainty as each of the three political parties held last-minute meetings to determine their candidates.
