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CLLR. BOBBY IS NEW

MAYOR

CLLR. BOBBY BYRNE (F.G.) is the new Mayor of Limerick. He was elected at last night's meeting of the city council, when he defeated the Fianna Fail candidate, Cllr. Clem Casey, by 12 votes to 4. Cllr. Jim Kemmy, Independent, abstained.

Cllr. Byrne's 12 votes came from the members of the former Coalition parties on the council, and Cllr. Casey received his party's four votes. The election was marked by accusations of skullduggery, double-talking, playing to the gallery, and acting out a farce.

The angry exchanges began after Ald. Ted Russell proposed Clir Byrne as a candidate for Mayor. Clir. Gus o'Driscoll seconded.

Clir. Paddy Kiely got to his feet and appealed to the parties to re-consider their proposal. He said he knew before heir proposal his said he knew before he proposed him that Clir. Che Casey would be defeated.

However, he went on to point out that at the start of the present ouncil, when the then Clir. Des O'Malley challenged. Labour and Fine Gael on the question of rotation, both of those parties promised that on the last year of the council the position of Mayor would be given to a Fianna Fail member.

He appealed to them to reconsider their nomination of Clir.

Byrne, whom he had the greatest
respect for, but he also wanted fair
play for the minority party on the

council.

Cllr. Kiely explained that at the last local election the three parties were given equal numbers on the council. He warned that the people would again decide on the com-

position of the council at the next local election.

Clir. Kiely said that the people of Limerick had made their choice for Clir. Casey — not only through a Limerick Leader poll — but he himself had heard their wishes on his way around the city.

He said that it was a thorough isgrace that Clfr. Casey was not etting the support of the other arties, and he once again ppealed to the parties to allow lem Casey to be bleeted to the

"I said — on my mortal soul — we will take our time and jump the fences as we come to them.
"I made no pledge, good, bad or indifferent," he claimed.
He went on to reveal that there were approaches made to him to make an agreement with Fianna Fail, and that if he agreed to support Clir. Casey then Labour would be guaranteed two years of Mayor during the next term.
"That skullduggery and double-talking did not appeal to me." he went on, and he criticised the Fianna Fail men for coming along later seeking fair play and justice.
He rejected their attitude of righteousness.
Ald. Coughlan went on to reveal that Clir. Kiely rang his wife and his son to make a deal about supporting Clir. Casey and getting two years as Mayor for Labour members.

"If I live as long as Methuselah's cat I will never be a party to this skullduggery." he stated.
He added: "I want it irrevocably noted that I am a committed Coalitionist."

Ald. Coughlan said that he made no deal and was not a party to any skullduggery.

Ald. Ted Russell said he was not a party to any deal either. He added that he might have been prepared to consider a Fianna Fail candidate if there had been any evidence that Fianna Fail had departed from their policy in other areas of grabbing all they could. However, he added, that there was no such evidence.

Clir. Jack Bourke pointed out to Ald. Coughlan that the leader of the Labour Party had said there was now no Coalition.

He concluded that Ald. Coughlan was playing to the gallery.

Cllr. Bourke disclosed that he had listened to people saying that Cllr. Casey should get a turn as Mayor this year.

Those people, he alleged, included the outgoing Mayor Cllr. Frank Prendergust, and also Cllr. Frank Prendergust, and also Clr. Frank Leddin and Ald. Mick Lipper, T.D.

Pious

"They can make these pious statements when there is no vote," he added.

He said that Ald. Russell and Ald. Coughlan had also expressed the same opinion.

Ald. Coughlan was about to reply when the Mayor, Cllr. Prendergast, attempted to restore order by asking the members not to demean the whole affair and he said he did not want the event to turn into an unruly one.

However, the arguing went on despite his efforts.

Cllr. Bourke commented to the Mayor: "You are in the chair. You are the only one who can control him (Ald. Goughlan)... except the people of Limerick who put him out of the Dail".

Cllr. Jim Kemmy then spoke and he thought the "whole farce is nothing new".

He said this happened every year. He thought the use of the word election was a misnomer, because the people had nothing to do with what went on.

Clir. Kemmy said he was impressed by the way the merchants stuck together on the council. However, he did not think it was in order for the trade union officials to be co-operating and working with these merchants.

The Labour members were supposed to represent the workers, he said, but they did not, and he added that he could see the fruits of their work all around him. He objected to Labour members going around asking for graces and favours from Ministers or anyone clse.

Cilr. Kemmy said the Mayor was only a buffer between the people and the bureaucrats. "I would not have anything to do with that," he said, adding that in his opinion people who went to see the Mayor were being treated like dirt having to wait on the landing to see him. Cilr. Prendergast stated that his first and last concern was the Irish first and last concern was the Irish first and last concern was the Irish Labour Party and he would not do anything to betray it. He said as Mayor he always looked upon himself as a servant of the people. "I never made anyone who came to me feel inferior." he commented.
