He was just over seventy. Most of his holiday at home had been spent in Limerick City, where he had many old friends and made new ones.

The Monsignor was brother of the late Patrick Quigley, Croughlahan, and of the late Edward Quigley, Ballyculeen, Croom. His family was well-known throughout Co. Limerick. He himself was recognised throughout the United States as a very distinguished Churchman. His remains were taken to the parish he administered for so many years.
