DEATH OF MR. WM. CORBETT, C.E.

We announce with very sincere regret the death of Mr. Wm. Corbett, C.E., M.R.I.A.I., which took place at his residence Wilmount, Landowne Road, yesterday morning. He has been in failing health for sometime past, but nevertheless the sad news came rather as a surprise to the citizen. His death removes one of the few remaining links connecting the present with the past. Mr. Corbett who belonged to an old Limerick family, was appointed City Surveyor in the year 1854 in the mayoralty of the late Mr. Henry Watson. He filled that office with great ability and zealous interest in the welfare of the city, down to the year 1899, when he retired after the passing of the Local Government Act, and was succeeded by the present City Surveyor, Mr. J. J. Peacocks, C.E. During his long official career Mr. Corbett carried out very many important municipal undertakings. He was engineer of the Cork-aree embankment, a large work in its way; he initiated block-paving in the city, beginning with the Dock Road. Many sewerage schemes were also carried out under his supervision, as well also as the erection of artisans' dwellings under Corporate control. He was also identified with the Limerick waterworks scheme. Mr. Corbett enjoyed an extensive private practice, being the architect of various ecclesiastical works and public buildings, including the Franciscan Church, Clonlara Church, and the new Church of St. Joseph at present being erected in the Military Road. Since his resignation of the City Surveyorship Mr. Corbett had gone into well earned retirement. Mr. Corbett was a most kindly and courteous gentleman, possessing the highest respect and confidence of the citizens at large and though he had attained the ripe age of 79 years, his death is deeply regretted. The city flag is to-day at half mast. The funeral will take place to-morrow morning for Mount St. Lawrence.
