THE LATE MR. W. E. CORBETT.

THE FUNERAL.

Yesterday morning the remains of this deeply lamented gentleman were removed from his late residence, Willmount, Manis Road, for interment at the New Cemetery. Although the hour was unusually early, the funeral was of large dimensions, and was representative of all classes of the citizens, the deceased having been universally respected. The remains were enclosed in a massive oak coffin, heavily mounted, the breastplate bearing the following inscription—

W. E. CORBETT,
Died February 1st, 1904,
Aged 79 Years.
