## Objection By Garda

Objection was raised by the authorities in the District today, before Justice D. F. O'Connell, on the granting of applications for the licences of Kate Punch and Mary O'Connell, licensed traders, Newmarket, for a general exemption from the respect of auctions being held in the Paddocks and races in Greenpark. The order to have business carried out between 2.30 to 3.30 p.m. closing hour.

Mr. Griffin—There is an objection as they want to extend the hours between 2.30 p.m. to 3.30 p.m. In view of the fact that there is an objection I am objecting the application on the grounds that Mr. O'Donovan, solicitor, does not think it will make any sense to adjourn it for a week. Is there any jurisdiction? I don't think that there is an Exemption Order in the markets.

## VETERANS' BONUS LAW

Special session of the Indiana Assembly has just passed a bill, rolled Bill No. 557, which will set the deadline date for filing World War II bonus applications until December 31, 1951.

Amendment to the original Bonus Law will allow the holder of State at Washington to accept as valid applications which have been received after the last deadline date—April 30, 1951—to accept any others in Washington on or before midnight, December 31, 1951.

Provisions of the amendment are being pushed in order that all World War II veterans who have not yet filed for the bonus will have their last opportunity to do so.

## He Offered The Guard a "High" Drive

At Kildysart Court yesterday (writes our Ennis correspondent), Patrick Sexton, Lavalla, Ballynacally, Co. Clare, was fined £5 and disqualified from driving for twelve months on a charge of attempting to drive a motor tractor while drunk at Labasheeda on the 5th inst.

Garda T. Forde told the Court that at 10.30 p.m., in the village street, he saw Sexton stagger from the driving seat and swing the starting handle. He approached the defendant who told him: "I drank 17 pints to-day. I will give you a high drive if you come with me." He was "stupid" drunk.

Mr. P. O'Shea, solr., admitting the offence, told Justice Gordon Hurley that "the tractor was as incapacitated as the driver." It had two wet plugs, and it was doubtful if the defendant could have started the engine.

There was no previous conviction. Supt. J. Dawson prosecuted.

## HAD NO VALID LICENCE

Because his son, who was driving the motor car, had no valid driving licence, Dominick Conway, Ballinacurra, Weston, Limerick, was before the City District Court to-day charged with employing his son to drive the vehicle while not the holder of a valid licence and thus was not covered by insurance. The son, who was under age, was similarly charged.

Sergeant P. Connolly gave evidence that on the 20th August, he observed the son driving the car. The car was the property of Dominick Conway and it was a hackney. The son produced a driving licence which covered only the driving of a motor cycle. In view of the fact that he was only 16 years of age he had no valid licence to drive the car. He, therefore, was not covered by insurance.

The Justice remarked that it was an unusual case. Witness told the Justice that Dominick Conway was under the impression that his son had a proper driving licence.

Mr. D. J. O'Malley, solr., defending, explained that Dominick Conway was full sure that his son had a driving licence, and he was not defying the law in any way.

Dominick Conway was fined £5 for aiding and abetting on the insurance charge of 10/- on the driving licence charge. His son
