Mr. William Moran ran out into the street in his night attire. He had a very narrow escape as he was sleeping in the bedroom off the kitchen.

To-day, the family were salvaging what they could from the remains of the gutted store and shop. The kitchen of the house is blackened with smoke and scorched by the flames.
