AFTER THE REMAINS of the late Councillor Frank Glasgow were brought to the Church of Our Lady of the Rosary last night, a special meeting of the City Council was held.

There was a very large attendance at the church, as the coffin was borne up the aisle by six of the deceased's fellow Councillors.

And one of the nation's representatives at the European Parliament, Mr. Michael Herbert, T.D., postponed his departure for Brussels by a day to tender his sympathy to the relatives at the church.

There was a lengthy cortege from St. John's Hospital, all the way out to the church on the Ennis Road.

Sympathisers

The Mayor, Councillor Paddy Kiely, was helped to bear the coffin inside the church doors by Alderman Steve Coughlan, T.D., and Councillors J. P. Liddy, Sean Fielding, Jack Bourké and Frank Leddin.

The remains were met by Fr. James Galvin, C.C.

After prayers in Irish, hundreds of sympathisers filed past the coffin, and tendered their condolences to the deceased's family.

They were his wife, Eileen; son, Rian; daughter, Mrs. Paschal Ryan; brother, Paddy, and sister, Madge.
