He made his plea for uni-ty between rural and urban Limerick to overcome this difficulty.

"There are too many peo-"There are too many people in the county, perhaps, who try to ignore the city of Limerick's dilemma with its falling population," Mayor Kemmy declared.

"If Limerick city goes

"If Limerick city goes down as capital city it brings down the whole region," he warned.
"If you take Cork they would take a different attitude altogether. Cork people would be very proud of Cork city as the Southern capital

"Similarly we must have the same attitude in Limer-ick and the Mid-West. We should be proud of the city of Limerick.

"If we fall below a population of 50,000 we lose our status as a city and that would be a disaster for us, particularly now that we are 800 years old."

After making his plea for unity between the city and county he added: "Unfortunately there were not too many county councillors here to hear me."

"The Limerick Show is a very good bridging of the gap between the urban and rural communities," he
