Meighan has a particular interest in Limerick, as his grandfather, Joseph Meighan, was one of five brothers who left from here for the United States about 1870.

Father Meighan is anxious to meet any of his relatives who may be in Limerick or to hear from anyone who may be able to give him information on them.

His grandfather, Joseph Meighan worked in the New
