Mayor's Election Coined Making Plans For Limerick's Biggest Ever Musical Event

COUNCILLOR JOSEPH P. LIDDY (Fianna Fail), a member of the Borough Council for the past six years, was, at a meeting of that body on Saturday last, elected Mayor of Limerick in succession to Councillor C. P. Keyes, N.T. (Labour), who did not seek re-election. It took two polls to decide the Mayoralty. In the first, Councillor J. Danagher, N.T., was eliminated in a three candidate contest. In the second Councillor Liddy was elected by 7 votes to 6 for Councillor P. J. Donnellan (Ratepayers' Association). Three abstained from voting, and another member did not attend.

Councillor Liddy's election to the office of first citizen, which this term carries with it a salary of £750, plus £250 vouched expenses, coincided with his 47th birthday.

The usual tense atmosphere of the Mayoralty occasion prevailed in a crowded Council Chamber of the Town Hall on Saturday last, when a special meeting of the Corporation was held for the purpose of filling the office of first citizen for the ensuing twelve months.

Soon after the members of the Council and civic officials filed into the formally decorated chamber at 12 noon, the roll of attendance was called by Mr. J. McHugh, the Assistant Town Clerk. At that moment a little excitement grew as Councillor Joseph Carr (Fianna Fail) and Councillor Patrick Mulcahy (Sinn Fein) were not present. The tension of that brief period was relieved when a smiling Councillor Carr made his way through the assembly and took his seat. It was anticipated that Councillor Mulcahy would not turn up.

The drama of the Mayoralty contest was embarked upon when it was known that there were three candidates. The outgoing Mayor, Councillor Keyes, who presided, informed the meeting that he was not seeking re-election.

THE THREE PROPOSED. There was a lull before the first proposer of a nomination got to his feet. Once Deputy Alderman O'Malley (Fianna Fail) proposed Councillor Liddy and was seconded in Irish by Councillor Frank Glasgow the interest in the proceedings gathered momentum. Councillor Frank Wallace (Ratepayers' Association) followed by proposing Councillor P. J. Donnellan, a fellow member of his Association, and he

was heart-breaking to go down to Sarsfield Street this week, added Ald. Coughlan, and to see machinery leaving the old-established firm of Spillane and the premises being stripped to the four walls.

Alderman Coughlan said he wished to refer to the action of Alderman Russell in voting for the outgoing Mayor. They were disappointed but not surprised. Alderman Russell came into their party and they were glad to see him.

Mayor - I cannot allow you to proceed on these lines. Unless you have something else to say you must resume your seat.

Ald. Coughlan - I have something else to say. Mayor - Well, continue. Ald. Coughlan - I want to say that we cannot give our votes to the Fianna Fail Party, which has been responsible for unemployment and emigration and, furthermore, which has established a concentration camp at the Curragh, where young men are locked up without trial. You will not allow me to refer to the Independent deputy, Alderman Russell.

Mayor - No. Any reference of that kind has nothing to do with this election, but you are entitled to explain why you are not voting.

Ald. Coughlan. I am sorry, because I had some glorious things to say about the Independent deputy, Alderman Russell. No. make a digestive pill that would help the deputy to digest what I was going to say.

Ald. Coughlan - Another place and another time. Ald. Coughlan - A later occasion will be ours and I will be there. Ald. Russell - And so will I.

RESPECT FOR MAYORALTY. He wished to pay tribute also to the citizens, who had shown nothing but honour and respect for the position he held. He, too, in future would have greater honour and respect for the office of Mayor, and greater honour and respect for the citizens of Limerick, who had shown themselves worthy to have him as their Mayor.

A MOST WORTHY CHOICE. Ald. O'Malley said he had great pleasure in proposing Councillor Liddy as Mayor for the coming year. As the members of the Council were concerned, all were fully aware of his capabilities and he thought if he were elected Mayor he would, indeed, be a most worthy choice. He had always found him to be a man of the highest honour and integrity, a family that had fine national traditions and were not found wanting when the time came for them to be of service to their country.

nellan had carried on a long civic tradition. He was Mayor for three years but that was a long time ago. He felt the time had come when he should again go to Councillor Donnellan. Mr. Donnellan was manager of one of Limerick's largest factories and he was noted for the square deal he always gave his workers. That in itself was a recommendation. They could talk about their industries and the lack of them, but the industries they had and continued to give employment under people like Mr. Donnellan were what counted in the long run. As regards the amount of salary, he would leave that to the experts. He and he felt sure that there was very little left over to any Mayor by the time his term of office concluded. He did not agree with the proposal to vouch expenses. Such an idea was repugnant and sounded too much like a clock-in for work in the mornings. He did not like check-in on any Mayor, and he proposed that the salary remain the same.

THE CLANN CANDIDATE. Ald. S. Coughlan (Clann na Poblachta) rose for the fourth time in proposing a Mayor of Limerick. On that occasion he had great pleasure in proposing his colleague, Councillor Jack Danagher, who had the energy, drive, and ability to fill the office. He was sure that Councillor Danagher would fully maintain the dignity of the office of Mayor and bring to it drive, energy and fearlessness, by which he was widely seconded.

BY SPECIAL PERMISSION. Father Creed said that the performance by the Cathedral would be given in St. John's Cathedral on Thursday, October 30. He explained that a Cathedral was a most fitting scene for the production of oratorios, particularly so for the "Dream of Gerontius," which dealt in a profound way with a profound Christian theme.

THE THEME OF THE ORATORIO. Father Griffith, in reply to a series of questions, said that the "Dream of Gerontius," the verses of which were composed by John Keble, was done to music by Edward Elgar, was a sublime work. It told the story of the passage, immediately after death, of a man's soul into the after-life before the Throne of God. The music and words were soul-stirring throughout, but were of surpassing power and dignity in the celestial choir, sung in sixteen parts, including and in the Demons' Choir. The performance would take two hours, exclusive of an interval of fifteen minutes.

HIGH PRAISE BY LUTHERAN PASTOR. Father Griffith said that when Our Lady's Choir presented the oratorio at the Berlin Festival, in conjunction with the Berlin Philharmonic Society, the head of the Lutheran Church in East Germany paid a courtesy call on the Society to express his admiration for their performance. This divine said that their rendering of the oratorio came as a shining light from the

west to the East. The City Manager, asked if booking for the performance had been opened, said that it had for the two guinea seats. The City Manager explained that the seating in the Cathedral would be so re-arranged as to provide accommodation for 2,000 patrons. SUPPORTED BY SOLOISTS. Father Griffith, replying to other questions, said that the choir of 36 voices would be supported by three soloists—tenor, mezzo-soprano and bass. The tenor had not yet been chosen, but they had been fortunate in securing the services of the world-renowned Polish bass, Manion Nowakowski and Miss Keristina Meyer, the Swedish prima donna.

In some individual cases anglers caught as many as fifteen fish in a day's fishing on the river.

WILL ATTEMPT TO SWIM ATLANTIC. A French accountant, 35 year-old Maurice Tondou, practised in the River Seine over the week-end for an attempt to swim the Atlantic. Mr. Tondou, who is married, expects to take 70 days to make the crossing, starting in early August. He plans to swim eight hours a day, pushing before him a rubber dinghy, on which he will rest the upper part of his body. The dinghy will contain food, water and a radio, and will provide his sleeping quarters.

MONEY BEQUEST TO THE POPE. An estate of about \$24,000 (about £8,000) has been left to the Pope by a man who was believed to have died penniless. It was reported yesterday in New York by Mr. Ernest Spasato, a lawyer, who said that a will of Mr. Consolato Mirli, who died on July 27th, 1947, had been uncovered and disclosed the estate in bank deposits and bonds. The will left the bulk of the estate specifically to the Pope or "to his successor."

A man jumped from the dance floor to the stage of the Scala Ballroom, Wolverhampton, when a small group of the band was playing on Saturday night and damaged, with an axe, instruments left by absent players.
