President Represented At Funeral Of Mrs. O'Donovan

President de Valera was represented at the funeral in Limerick to-day of Mrs. Maire O'Donovan by Col. J. J. Fitzsimmons, O.C. Sarsfield Barracks, Limerick.

The late Mrs. O'Donovan, who died on Saturday last, was Deputy Mayor of Limerick from May, 1921, to January, 1922, when, following the murder of her brother-in-law, ex-Mayor Michael O'Callaghan, she was co-opted on the Limerick City Council and deputised for Mayor Stephen O'Mara during his absence in America in connecton with the Republican Loan.

There was a large and representative attendance at the funeral, which took place to Mount St. Laurence Cemetery, Limerick, to-day (Monday), and the Bishop of Limerick was represented by Rev. M. O'Callaghan.
