Death Of Mr. Philip Mountshannon Was O'Donovan The Apple Of Their Eye

With very sincere regret we
announce the death of Mr. Philip
O'Donovan, ex-Mayor of Limerick,
which took place at his residence,
Avoca, Dooradoyle, yesterday even-
ing after a long illness.

The late Mr. O'Donovan was
born of farming stock in the parish
of Murroe 77 years ago. At an
early age he came into the city to
get a business training and was
soon to establish a reputation for
himself as a man of outstanding
qualities. He opened business for
himself in Cathedral Place, where,
in addition to the sale of groceries,
wines, spirits, etc., he manufact-
ured mineral waters. A further
development of his successful busi-
ness career was the opening of a
coal yard in Honan's Quay, be-
coming in a comparatively short
time one of the city's leading coal
importers. He retired from busi-
ness some five years ago.

In 1910 he was elected a member
of the Corporation as an Alderman
for the Irishtown Ward and three
years later, in 1913, he was elected
to the office of Mayor, a dignity
that was conferred on him on the
two succeeding years—1914 and
1915. He was a most successful
occupant of the Civic Chair and it
can be said of him that he added
to the dignity of the exalted office.
A sterling nationalist, he was
a staunch supporter of John Red-
mond, though, on a notable occa-
sion, he refused to give a civic wel-
come to the Home Rule Lord
Lieutenant—Wimbourne. When

asked later why he had, as Mayor,
declined to receive the Lord Lieut-
enant in the Town Hall, he ex-
plained that as the motion to give
a civic welcome had been carried
by only a small majority, he felt
that he would not be justified in
taking part in the ceremony.

In passing, it might be men-
tioned that the late Ald. Michael
Joyce, M.P., acting as Deputy
Mayor, received the Lord Lieuten-
ant and Lady Wimbourne in the
Town Hall.

The late Mr. O'Donovan, during
his Mayoralty, led the fight against
the Harbour Board, who wanted to
make the Swivel Bridge a fixture,
cutting off Arthur's Quay from the
"ocean" harbour. The issue event-
ually went to the House of Lords,
where the Corporation's objection
to the closing of the bridge was
upheld.

In his public and private life he
commanded the esteem, regard and
respect of all sections of the com-
munity. It could not be otherwise,
for he was a man of great quali-
ties—kind and charitable, yet
strong and vigorous. Hating cant
and humbug or anything savouring
of snobbery, he was ever ready to
call a spade just a spade no matter
the "quality" of company in which
he may be in. He was a splendid
type of gentleman and by his death
Limerick has lost a citizen who
never lost an opportunity to ad-
vance the interests of the city of
his adoption.

Three Limerick boys found
Mountshannon the apple of their
eye on 16th August last. After fill-
ing two bags of apples in an
orchard there a surprise swoop
was made on them by the owner,
Garrett O'Mara, who duly landed
the boys in Castleconnell Garda
Station. In the Liberties Court
to-day, before Justice D. F.
Gleeson, the boys were charged
with stealing the apples, value 10/-.
The boys pleaded guilty.

Supt. E. O'Riordan, who prosec-
uted said that Mr. O'Mara's
orchard was situated at Mount-
shannon. He found the three city
boys with two bags of his apples
in their possession. They got no
permission to take them. Mr.
O'Mara took the boys in his car to
Castleconnell Garda Station, where
he got them identified. The boys
gained access to the orchard
through a gap in the wall, and he
wanted this conduct to stop.

One of the boys said to the Jus-
tice that they went out to Mount-
shannon on the occasion for wild
apples in the woods. "Everyone
goes camping out there."

Justice—Everyone does not go
camping out there. It is private
property. This is the annual season
for this sort of business. What
were you going to do with these
apples—take them home and sell
them?

A defendant—Eat them.
The Superintendent said that the
apples were got back and no
damage was done to the trees.

The Justice imposed a £1 fine in
each case.

NO WIRELESS LICENCE: FINED 2/6

Patrick O'Connell, Ballymacstra-
deen, Croom, Co. Limerick, was
fined 2/6 by Justice C. S. Kenny in
Croom Court last Tuesday when he
was prosecuted by the Minister for
Posts and Telegraphs for not hav-
ing his wireless licensed.

Mr. O'Donovan, an officer of the
Posts and Telegraph Department,
said he called to O'Connell's house
on July 1st and discovered that the
wireless was not licensed. Its for-
mer licence expired on the 28th
February.

Imposing the 2/6 fine, the Justice
ordered O'Connell to pay 12/6 costs.

Communists Asked To Account For 3,404 Prisoners

The Communist authorities in
Korea were asked this morning in
Panmunjon to return 3,404 United
Nations prisoners on their hands,
or account for their fate.

Major-General Brien, senior
United Nations Commander on the
Armistice Commission, told the
Communists that they had still
United Nations prisoners to the
number of 3,404.

They comprised 1,000 Americans,
19 British, 9 Australians, 8 South
Africans, and most of the others
were South Koreans.

Peking Radio claimed that the
United Nations held 245 Chinese
prisoners who wanted to be re-
patriated.

The United Nations denied the
charge.
