Aged Woman Found Dead On Roadside

THE body of a seventy-four-year-old pensioner, Miss Kate Naughton, of Newmarket-on-Fergus, Co. Clare, over which her own coat had been placed, was found late on Wednesday night on the roadside about three-quarters of a mile from the cottage where she lived alone.

The discovery was made by a pedestrian, Mr. Patrick Malone, farmer, of Urland, who reported to the local Garda Station.

The body, which bore multiple injuries, was removed to the home of her nephew, Mr. Michael Hickey, Newmarket-on-Fergus, where an inquest was held yesterday by Dr. T. O'Connor, Coroner for East Clare.

The medical evidence was that death was due to multiple injuries as a result of being crushed. The injuries were consistent with being hit and run over by a mechanically propelled vehicle.

Patrick Malone said he found the body, which he recognised as that of Miss Naughton, close to the ditch. She usually wore her coat capelike over her shoulders, but on finding the body it appeared to him that it had been placed over her.

A verdict in accordance with the medical evidence was returned by the jury.

Widespread Gardai investigations are being carried out following the occurrence.
