Bishop's ban on mayor's reading not based on church ruling

THE refusal by the Bishop of Limerick, Dr Newman, to allow the city's mayor, a member of the Church of Ireland, to read a lesson at a Mass last Sunday to launch Limerick Civic Week is not in line with the Catholic Church's revised Directory of Ecumenism, which allows readings by members of other churches "on exceptional occasions".

In a statement, the Mayor, Councillor Jan O'Sullivan, said that in the absence of a satisfactory explanation from Dr Newman as to why she was prevented from carrying out this traditional mayoral task, "Limerick City Council will have to consider its position with regard to the nature of its future participation in the Civic Week Mass".

Dr Newman yesterday issued a statement quoting from the Irish hierarchy's 1976 Directory of Ecumenism to support his decision. This said that while it was appropriate for members of other Christian denominations to join with the congregation in prayers,

appropriate for members of other Christian denominations to join with the congregation in prayers, or even to lead some prayers, "they may not act as scripture reader or preacher at Mass". This was because "the liturgy of the word is an integral part of the total eucharistic liturgy", and the Eucharist or Mass holds "unique place" in the Catholic Church's worship.

However, the new Directory of Ecumenism published by the Vatican's Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity last year specifically allows bishops, "on exceptional occasions and for a just cause", to permit "a member of another church or ecclesiastical communion to take on the task of

Ms O'Sullivan, a Labour member of the council, said yesterday that she had consulted with the leaders of the political groups on the council, all of whom had supported her intention to seek an explanation from Dr Newman. explanation from Dr Newman.

At their quarterly meeting last October, the Irish bishops asked their Episcopal Commission on Ecumenism, chaired by Archbishop Desmond Connell of Dublin, to update their directory in line with the latest instructions from Rome. from Rome.

However, a leading Irish Cath-However, a leading Irish Catholic ecumenist, who asked not to be named, told *The Irish Times* yesterday that it had been informally accepted as long ago as the 1970s that a bishop had the discretion to allow a member of another church to read the lesson at other church to read the lesson at Mass in exceptional circumstances, such as a mixed marriage. "The bishops have their own rule books that we don't see," he said.

He said this had not happened very often in Ireland: Archbishop Dermot Ryan of Dublin was the only member of the Hierarchy he only member of the Hierarchy ne could remember who had allowed it to happen occasionally. "It would be an important step forward for ecumenism if we could make it the norm," he added.

The former Church of Ireland Dean of Limerick, the Rev Maurice Talbot, recalled yesterday that the first woman Mayor of Limerick, Mrs Frances Condell, who was also a Church of Ireland member, had read the lesson at St. member, had read the lesson at St John's Cathedral in 1963 in the time of Dr Newman's predeces-sor, Dr Henry Murphy.
