AN extension of the city boundary is to be vigorously pursued by the city's newly elected mayor Cllr Dick Sadlier.

An economics lecturer at Limerick RTC, Cllr Sadlier was elected with the support of the Labour Party by nine votes to four for Cllr Joe

four for Cllr Joe Harrington.
Cllr Harrington was supported by Alderman John Gilligan, Cllr John Ryan (DL) and Cllr Jack Bourke (FF).
Fine Gael whose leader on the Council, Cllr Gus O'Driscoll criticised the lack of rotation of the may-

lack of rotation of the may-oralty led his party out of the chamber before the call of votes.

In his mayoral address,
Cllr Sadlier, who lives in
Castletroy but represents
Ward Four, said he intended to pursue vigorously and at least, ensure that the case for a boundary extension was significantly advanced

was significantly advanced during the coming year.

"Limerick is the third largest city in the Republic and it is most important that this position be retained," he claimed.
"Substitute which are seen."

Suburbs which are now adjoining our city and in which many residents regard themselves as city people, must surely be included within our boundaries," he claimed.

"It is e: titrely illogical," he said "that a city, denied the opportunity to expand its boundary for some 43 years, is yet expected to fund the necessary infrastructure of the expanded areas."

The office of Mayor, for-tunately he said in his opin-ion, does not carry with it

executive powers.

It does, however, he said, enable significant influence to be exercised and, if har-nessed and channelled positively, can project the city in a manner that reflects well, not just nationally, but

also internationally.
"I will endeavour to ensure that Limerick is, at all times, shown in the best possible light and that the natural advantages and many modern facilities of the city are promoted on as wide a platform as possi-ble "he promised

ble," he promised. Over the last decade, he said, significant progress has been made in improving the physical environment of of the inner city redevelop-ment programme must now be the envy of every other

"It is an outstanding example of what can be achieved given the fullest co-operation between central and local governments, and private enterprise - our economy surely demands more such initiatives," he claimed

claimed.

However, he added, we must continue with this progress and ensure that the impetus was maintained.

He described it as particularly gratifying that the King's Island project is in

place and that the Hunt museum is scheduled for completion in the autumn of 1995.
